Toronto Welcomes
and Entertains
THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES
The Duke and Duchess of
Cornwall and York.

The recent reception tendered
 Their Royal Highnesses the Duke
 and Duchess of Cornwall and
 York, in Toronto, was a fitting
 climax to the series of royal
 welcomes received along the route
 of their memorable tour through
 Canada.

The brilliant decorations of flags,
 bunting, etc., by day, and the
 elaborate and magnificent illumina-
 tions of the principal buildings,
 arches and streets by night have
 never been equalled in any
 Canadian City. Never in its
 history has Toronto been thronged
 with so many people as the gay,
 jolly and good natured crowds
 which collected from all parts of
 the Dominion, anxious to do
 honor to the future King of the
 great Empire of which we have
 the proud privilege of forming a
 part.

The proceedings commenced on
 the afternoon of the 10th inst.,
 when the royal pair arrived at a
 temporary station erected on
 Dupont St. North Toronto. Here
 they were met and welcomed by
 Premier Ross, Inspector Hughes
 and others, and were treated to a
 patriotic chorus by thousands of
 Toronto's school children eager
 to get a glimpse of Their High-
 nesses and pay their homage. The
 whole route of the procession to
 the City Hall was lined on either
 side by His Majesty's Loyal
 Soldiers, who assisted the police
 in keeping back the eager throngs
 who crowded the streets. At the
 City Hall the Mayor read the
 civic address of welcome while a
 chorus of fifteen hundred adult
 voices under Prof. Torrington
 rendered several patriotic songs
 to the great delight of the royal
 party and the thousands of spec-
 tators. Addresses were also read
 from prominent societies and
 corporations throughout Ontario.
 The royal party then repaired to
 Government House for dinner and
 in the evening attended a grand
 concert in Massey Hall.

But Friday was the gala day.
 Long before the exhibition
 grounds were opened crowds were
 waiting for admission and before
 the time for the commencement
 of the Royal Review upwards of
 twenty thousand people occupied
 seats and other places of vantage.
 H. R. H. and the Duchess entered
 the grounds by different gates and
 each received a tremendous
 ovation on entering.

After inspecting the several
 regiments of Infantry and the
 Cavalry and Artillery Corps mobilized
 on Garrison Common the
 Duke took up his position on a
 stand erected for the occasion in
 front of the grand stand and pro-
 ceeded with the presentation of
 medals to the heroes of the Boer
 War. Upwards of six hundred
 South African Veterans received
 this coveted decoration from the
 hands of their future King while
 the Duchess looked smilingly and
 approvingly on a d rounds of
 applause greeted the soldiers.

The presentation of decorations
 was concluded about 2 o'clock
 when His Royal Highness mount-
 ed his grey charger and took up
 his position near the saluting point
 and then commenced a "march
 past" of Canada's citizen soldiers
 in which about eleven thousand
 of our country's defenders took
 part. First came the Cavalry
 Brigade followed by the Artillery
 division while the several city and
 rural regiments of infantry brought
 up the rear. The several military
 bands were stationed on the com-
 mon close by and as each struck
 up the music when its own reg-
 iment appeared and played it past
 the effect was most pleasing as
 well as inspiring.

Great satisfaction and enthu-
 siasm was manifested by the spec-
 tators at the fine deportment and
 soldierly appearance of the men
 as regiment after regiment passed
 the saluting point and more grat-
 ifying than all was the pleasure so
 plainly expressed by His Royal
 Highness. In this march past our
 Canadian Militia showed our citi-
 zens that it can compare with that
 of other countries just as favorable
 on parade as it has during the late
 war when it has taken its place
 beside the best Imperial reg-
 iments.
