Harvest Festival at All Saints'

Rev. J. H. Taney Preached the Special Sermon.

The annual harvest festival of All Saints' church was held on Thursday, and was well attended, the church being quite full. Rev. J. H. Taney, of Oshawa, was the special preacher, and he delivered an excellent sermon from the text, Gen. viii. 22, "While the earth remaineth, seed time and harvest, and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night, shall not cease." It was a sermon, beautiful in diction, delivered with grace and ease. It pointed out the faithfulness of God to His promises, and to many others as well. The whole earth speaks of the goodness of God. The duty of thanksgiving, and the beauty of the character which goes out to the Creator in love were pictured in eloquent language and apt illustrations. The duty of giving was the second topic of the discourse, and was made clear and pointed, and could not but justly appeal to every heart not callous with earthly satisfaction.

The service was conducted by the Rev. W. L. Armitage, the Rev. J. C. Davidson, Rev. E. A. Langfield, and Rev. C. W. Hedley also taking part. The special music was an enjoyable feature of the service, and the choir deserve every praise for their care and attention in every part. The rendition of the hymns, as well as the promptness and smoothness of the special services and anthem, and the shading and expression, showed the sympathy in a beautiful and heartfelt service. Anniversary Services at Mount Pleasant.
