A REDUCTION IN PRICE.

The Globe (Toronto) is making a strong and deserving bid for circulation. Finding that the reduction in the price of paper and the introduction of type-setting machinery have made it possible to publish the paper at a less cost, the price has been reduced from \$6 per annum to \$4 per annum for the early morning edition, and the second edition has been discontinued. This should give their circulation list a great increase, as it brings within the reach of every person a daily paper that is generally recognized as the leading paper in Canada. As there is to be no reduction in the size of the paper, and every department including the Saturday Illustrated edition, kept up to its present high standard, and considering the enormous expense that it goes to in order to give all the news every day, \$6 was not too much to pay for it. At \$4 per annum its subscription list should soon reach the 50,000 mark.

His Opportunity Gone.

The people of Toronto want a preference for Canadian products in the British market. When Mr. Bertram's leader arrived in England last June members of the Imperial Government at once made advances on the subject. They were prepared to discriminate in favour of our staple commodities. But Sir Wilfrid, the man of the sunny ways, told them bluntly that Canada desired no preferential treatment at the hands of the Mother Country. This rough answer caused the sensitive British heart to close right up, and Mr. Chamberlain declared that after that he would not touch the subject of an Imperial Customs union with a pair of tongs.

After having their generous offer thus flung back at them, British statesmen will never enter into a consideration of the matter again with any Government headed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Hence it is idle for Mr. Bertram to talk of doing anything to secure a preference as long as he supports Sir Wilfrid.—Mail and Empire.

Church Notes.

A Thanksgiving service will be held in Christ Church at 10.30 this morning, conducted by Rev. Wilson McCann, B. A., B. D. Union Thanksgiving service will be conducted in the Presbyterian Church this (Thursday) morning at 10.30, by Rev. E. Roberts.

The following is a short sketch: The first passage he called attention to was, 2 Cor. 8: 7. Ministers emphasize the other graces, faith, utterance, knowledge, and love. Why should the grace of giving be overlooked. Giving is a grace. What is grace? Grace is that something in a man which causes him to give. Intellect is a gift. Holy Spirit is a gift. God's gifts are like Himself, perfect, and when used properly give great enjoyment, and a man who enjoys any one, must enjoy them all to some extent. The next passage was 2 Cor. 9: 7-8. Some men say "I have not got money to give." "If I had more I would give." If you had ten millions you would give a cent. It is the principle of giving you require. Use the opportunities to have and they will be enlarged. If the principles were acted upon that the bible gives, we would have to give with a man says, "I have just enough to buy the necessities of life." Let him take the dollar and break it up, and take say one-twentieth of it, and offer it to God, and lay it aside. And the farmer, when he sells a load of grain, let him give to Christ the first amount, and give not grudgingly. It is human nature to give grudgingly to charitable purposes, or of necessity. When the collector calls, we look to see how much our neighbor gave and we must give or what would people think, and when they are gone out we say "be their those people, they are always wanting money for something," and so it is with all of us unless our heart is in it, until we come to Christ and ask Him for the right disposition. When we preach giving, we don't beg. It is as much the gospel as any other subject. Christ has all power on earth, physically and spiritually, elevating one and despising the other. Do you think He will allow those to want who give to him, Can He not enrich the farmer? What was that, that determined you to put a certain kind of grain on a certain field, and caused certain speculations to turn out good or ill. It was God. "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." There are several men I KNOW COULD SUPPORT A MISSIONARY THEMSELVES HERE, and if I met you in twenty years, you would be a great man, a good man, a blessing to the earth, if you did it in the right spirit. You know a man may give all he has and his body to be burned and it will be no good whatever. But we have enough to support two or three if we HAD THE GRACE.
