There were four gold seekers in the party of which he was a member and it was their bad fortune to have many privations to endure en route. Mr. Sargent asserts that the discomforts of the trip nor'h along the Skaguay route, by which the party travelled, were greater than the inconveniences suffered in the Klondike country. One of the members of the expedition was drowned. The boat in which they were travelling was capsized owing to its having been too heavily laden and the unlucky adventurer went down before his companions eyes. It was impossible to rescue


