A DISASTROUS SKIRMISH.

Boers Repulsed, But British Had Seven Killed-Maxims Abandoned.

London, Oct. 29 .- A despatch from Hoopstad, Orange River Colony, under date of Oct. 24, says: The Cape police had a stiff fight with two Boer commandoes yesterday. A convoy left Wegdraii in the afternoon, Shortly after it started the Boers appeared on the north bank of the river and attacked the police, but were repulsed with loss. On reaching higher ground a large body of Boers encircled the Cape Mounted Rifles' scouts. The Boers outnumbered the scouts ten to one, and as they poured in a murde ous rifle fire the Cape Mounted Rifles were compelled abandon two galloping Maxims. The guns were only abandoned after men had made the bravest effort to save them, and when they found this could not be done they destroyed the mechanism. The police then retired slowly, and a number of horses stampeded, but the officers and men pluckily remained and rescued their wounded and dismounted comrades. Just before dark the police were reinforced, and the Boers were completely repulsed, and the convoy reached this place without the loss of a single animal. The British casualties were

thirteen men taken prisoners. Boers Have 15 000 Men. London, Oct. 29 .- According to a despatch from Cape Town to The Daily Mail, the Boers have 15,000 men in the field, nearly half of whom are in Orange River Colony.
