# 200 KILLED IN PAOTINGFU.

## Allied Army, on Reaching City, Learn Details of Massacre.

How Americans Were Tortured—Ears, Fingers and Toes Cut Off Before They Were Beheaded by Orders of Viceroy. More Chinese Victims Have Been Named by France For Execution.

Peking, Oct. 22, via Shanghai, Oct. 27.—The allied expedition reached Paotingfu on Oct. 20, composed of French, German and Italian troops, and a body of English under the command of Gen. Gaslee. As one result of the world is now enabled to learn the fate of the missionaries there when the Boxer revolt began. Three English missionaries were rescued by the allies. Others, with thousands of native converts, have been slain.

Details of the massacre at Paotingfu turn out to be more revolting than ever reported. The Simcox family of five were burned out of their house and a boy of 12 years of age, who ran from the house into the street, was hacked to pieces by the Boxer mob. The rest were smoked out and killed. The father died fighting. The Misses Gould and Morrell were stripped and dragged into the street, where Miss Gould was put to death by a brutal brutality, and Miss Morrell, Mr. Taylor and Mrs. Pitkin were beheaded, after having their ears, fingers and toes cut off.

It has been discovered that the Viceroy ordered the massacre, but, after surrendering the city, he escaped to the mountains. More Chinese Victims Named. London, Oct. 29.—Dr. Morrison, writing to The Times, under date of Oct. 25, says: "The Foreign Ministers, in conference to-day, decided to add the names of Prince Yi and Ying Ning to those of the seven officials whose execution France has demanded. It is said that the commander of the allied troops at Paotingfu was the Provincial Treasurer, who was chiefly responsible for the ill-treatment of the rescued missionaries."

Chinese Rebels Slaughtered. Shanghai, Oct. 28.—The Chinese Imperial troops are pursuing the rebels in the south. There was a great battle between the rebels and Chinese troops on Oct. 23. The rebels were routed, and 600 of them were slaughtered.

France and Russia in Line. Vienna, Oct. 29.—The semi-official Politische correspondent asserts that France and Russia, after discussion, have decided to accept the Anglo-German agreement.

London, Oct. 29.—A despatch received at the War Office from Lord Roberts, dated Pretoria, Friday, Oct. 26, referring to the fighting of Gen. Harton's column with Gen. De Wet's force, Oct. 25, says: "The Boers were again routed. An additional officer and 12 men were killed and three officers and 25 men were wounded. The Boers lost 24 dead and 19 wounded on the field, and 26 Boers were made prisoners. Three Boers, who held up their hands in token of surrender, and then fired on the British, were court-martialed, convicted and sentenced to death. I have confirmed the sentence."

**DODGES ON CORPORAL PUNISHMENT.** The question of corporal punishment in schools has been discussed a good deal in Germany and Switzerland lately, and the Canton Bern has come to a decision in the matter. The new law which has been made is considered by some persons a compromise between the flagellants and use of the cane for "grave faults," such as indicate moral perversion; repeated lying is given as an instance, and it is expressly forbidden to punish for want of application. Girls are not to be punished physically at all.

**STONE SOLES FOR SHOES.** An inventor has hit upon a method of putting stone soles in boots and shoes. He mixes a waterproof glue with a suitable quantity of clean quartz sand and spreads it over the leather sole used as a foundation. These quartz soles are said to be very flexible, and to give the foot a firm hold, even on the most slippery surfaces.

**IT LOOKS LIKE CELLULOID.** A substitute for celluloid is now being produced from untanned leather, which is boiled in oil, which is said to resemble celluloid in every particular. It is known as marloid and shows a texture similar to horn, while it can be made flexible and elastic or hard and unyielding. It will take a high polish readily and may be stamped or pressed into any desired shape.

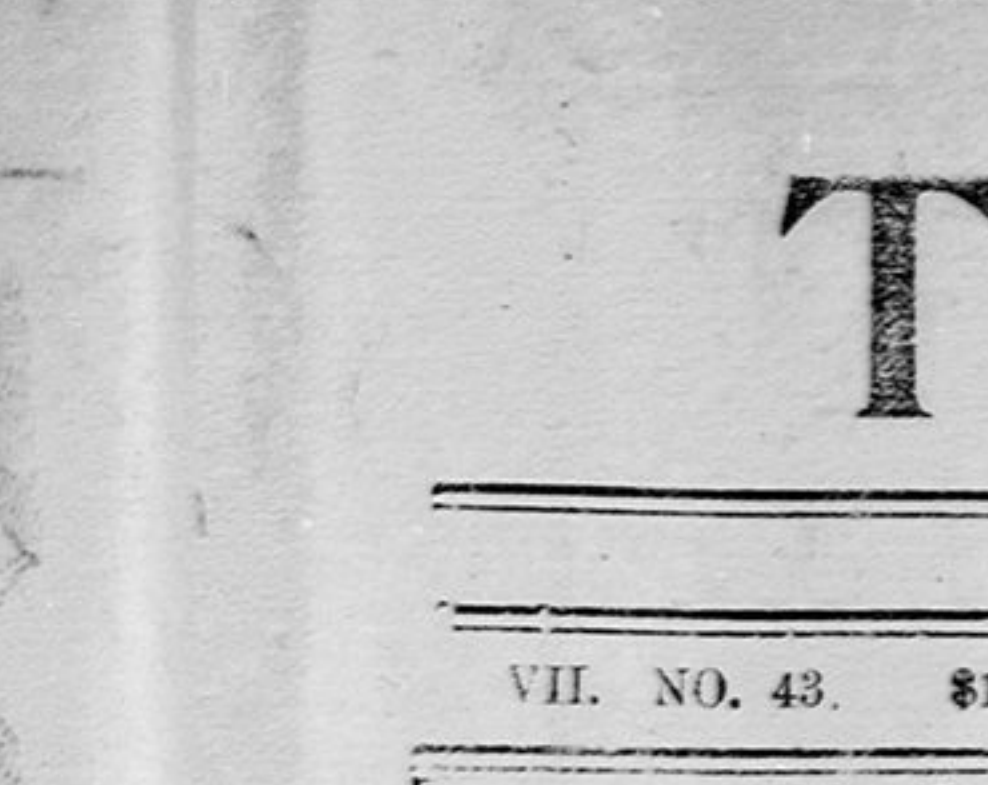
