CAVAN COUNCIL. Council Chamber, Cavan. Monday, Oct. 25th, 1904. The Council met this day in response to the call of the Reeve, at 10:30 o'clock a.m.

The minutes of the last meeting were read approved and signed. The Clerk read the Engineer's report on the Long Swamp drain which was filed in his office on Oct. 11th 1904, and he also read the petition of the land owners which had been presented to the Council respecting the said Long Swamp Drain.

One of the most successful meetings held in this section took place on Oct. 26th, in the interests of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., Liberal Candidate for Durham. The hall was crowded to the doors and many were unable to gain admission.

Mr. Aylesworth then took the stand and for over an hour held the closest attention of all present, the majority of whom were Conservatives. It was one of the best addresses the Janetville people ever listened to, quite equal to Sir Wilfrid's. All present were delighted, and if Durham elects Mr. Aylesworth they will have the best representative in the House of Commons.

Conservatives and Reformers admit that this meeting surpassed everything, and JANETVILLE WILL DO HER PART NOBLY on Nov. 3rd.

The Hon. Mr. Aylesworth on Monday evening addressed a house crowded to the doors at Mt Pleasant. Mr. H. V. Elson occupied the chair and Mr. W. Thexton made a few introductory remarks. By reason of having the time practically all to himself, Mr. Aylesworth was able to give the fullest exposition of the policy of the Government that has yet been given in this part of the Riding, especially in connection with the new Transcontinental R.R. He fully and convincingly answered all objections that had been raised by his opponents, and held the rapt attention of his audience for two hours. No open minded man could fail to be convinced by his masterly treatment of the issues of the day.

Monday night was Halloween, and the usual pranks were played by the small boys and girls and many suggestive mottoes were hung on the shop windows, some sarcastic, while others were merely done for a joke.

At a meeting of Temperance workers in the Town Hall Monday afternoon, it was decided to ask the Councils of Cavan and Millbrook to submit by laws abolishing the sale of fermented liquors. Petitions are now being circulated with this object.

It is safe betting that Col. Hughes will be elected by a majority of at least 530. The Col. is certainly making great headway in the campaign. From all parts of the Riding come most encouraging reports. The Col. is more popular than ever.
