EDITORIAL NOTES. Mr. Shortis, the father of the Valleyfield murderer, who is under sentence of death at Beauharnois, will arrive in Canada shortly. It is said that he will bring with him a petition, signed by prominent people in Ireland and England, asking that the sentence of death be charged to imprisonment for life.

The Montreal Herald points out that on Thursday last the Globe referred to Sir Mackenzie Bowell as the Grand Old Smasher, and adds that on the evening of the same day Mr. Gillespie, in North Ontario, thought the Globe was right. It appears that Mr. Gillespie saved his deposit by just forty votes.—Mail and Empire.

School Board Meeting. Last Thursday the Board of Education held a special meeting. The resignation of Mr. T. O. Page was read and accepted. An application from Mr. K. P. McLaughlin, for the position left vacant by Mr. Wright's resignation was read. He referred to Mr. Wright. On request of the board, Mr. Wright told Mr. McLaughlin's qualification and teaching ability. The board unanimously agreed to engage him. No other business was transacted. The telegram, accepting Mr. McLaughlin, reached him after he had been engaged by Orangeville High School Board.

Missionary Meeting. Rev. I. Stringer, Missionary of the Anglican Church within the Artc circle delivered an address in Christ Church last Tuesday evening. He told of the needs of the Indians and Esquimaux in a most simple and interesting manner. His address was to the children of the Sunday School, their parents and friends and was listened to by a large audience. Mr. Stringer showed by means of a magic lantern some views of missionaries, missions, and peoples of the far north. A liberal collection was given by those who attended to aid in mission work.

RICHER AND RICHER. Let God-Given Rights be Restored to the People. Willie Waldorf Astor's daily income is \$23,277; J. D. Rockefeller's \$20,853; Cornelius Vanderbilt's \$11,090; W.K. Vanderbilt's \$10,397, and the Gould's \$11,068. These are only a few samples of America's multi-millionaires.

When comes the money to pay this enormous tribute? It comes from the men whose toil produces all wealth—the wage-earners and farmers—whose average daily wage (and their work from morn till night) is something like \$1. Is it strange that the rich grow richer, and that just in the ratio as they ascend the scale of accumulated wealth the other side—the real wealth producers—drops, drops to the point of bare existence? The same unjust conditions which make the pauper create the millionaires. These conditions may be comprehended in one single phrase—the control by the few of the natural opportunities which belong equally to all.

The supreme duty of the hour is the restoration to the people of their God given rights and the taking from those who now possess them of all special privileges. Every other question now before the people pales into insignificance in comparison with this, and until this is accomplished the present evils will only increase in intensity—the incomes of the millionaires will mount higher and higher, the wages of the producer will drop lower to the starvation point and that means involuntary servitude.
