**Division of the Diocese.**  
 A paper read by William Grace, Esq., of Lindsay, on the financial aspect of the question.  
 To the Venerable Archbishop Allen and the Members of the Archdiocese of Peterborough, assembled in Lindsay, the 16th November, 1897.  
 Having been requested by the Secretary of this meeting to read a paper on the question of how \$10,000, could be raised or collected, in the interest of which will go into the fund from which the Bishop of the proposed new Diocese when appointed will receive part of his income, I now submit for your consideration the following:  
 That this \$10,000 should be equally divided between the five Counties composing the new diocese, namely \$2,000 each, and that a committee composed of the Rectors or Incumbents as the case may be, the Church Wardens and lay delegates be appointed in each Parish of the different Counties composing the new diocese to collect the amount allotted to each County namely \$2,000, and that this Committee when appointed be urgently requested to lose no time in making such collections until the endowment mentioned, \$10,000, be fully realized.  
 The amount expected from the share of the Clergy Commutation fund less the amount set apart for the present Bishop being an unknown quantity cannot at the present time be estimated but we must hope and believe we will get our full share of this fund from the parent diocese.  
 I find from the Government statistics of the last census 1891 the population of the whole diocese or rather of the five Counties composing it was 186,954, but I think I would be justified in assuming that this population would reach at the end of the present year, 200,000.  
 I also find that in 1891 the Church of England population was 32,620 and adding a proportionate increase to this number to January 1st, 1896, would make about 33,500. This would give the number of heads of families, at six to each family, (a large estimate) as 5583 at \$2.00 each would make \$11,166 and I am satisfied no Churchman worthy of the name would hesitate in giving the small sum of \$2,000 asked herein for the noble cause, the glory of God, and the better provision for the religious training of his or her children.  
 In addition to the above it must be remembered that we have in this proposed new diocese a great many wealthy and reputable churchmen who are well known for their liberality in Church matters as well as home and foreign missions, who will, I have no doubt, hail with delight this opportunity of subscribing harmoniously in order to consummate the glorious object we have undertaken.  
 I sincerely hope that if the views which I have set forth in this paper do not meet with your entire approval, they will be helpful at least to bring forth such a discussion thereon as will terminate in a scheme being adopted which will be for the best interest of the cause we have in view.

 The congregations of the above named places to point out to this Committee the respective advantages of their own Towns in order to better enable this committee to arrive at a correct conclusion.  
 This proposal and the election of the Bishop in the usual manner should remain in obedience until the fund is fully collected.
