The Roman Catholic Press and the South African War.

At the time of the Venezuelan difficulty the Roman Catholic press throughout this Continent was bitter in its denunciations of England and warmly espoused the cause of the little South American Republic. A similar condition prevails at present, especially on the Continent of Europe. The Ultramontane papers boldly avow their desire to see England humbled and the strength of Protestantism sapped. They indulge freely in vituperation of the great Protestant Nation and in predictions of her speedy downfall. The humiliation of Great Britain through a combination of the other powers is foreshadowed as a providential interposition, having for its end the reprobation of Protestantism and the restoration to the Papacy of its temporal power. This recent outburst of hostility to England is one of those reminders which we very much need—as to the real aims of Rome. Its vast organization does not exist merely for the purpose of making its own way of peace known to the anxious soul. It is, as it always has been, very much more than a religious organization. In its day of defeat and disappointment it does not cease to yearn for and to hope for its old supremacy over much of the world. It still wants the political and social machinery of the nations to be controlled from a central office at Rome. In its own way and by its own agents it still seeks to bring this about. The conception of the Roman Church as a world power, ever scheming to win, not the spiritual advantage, but the political and social control of nations, is too little understood by our people to-day. It was familiar enough during the long struggle of the Reformers, at intervals it has been brought home to the public mind with something of the old clearness. But for the most part people overlook the fact, and so miss the key to some things in domestic and some things in foreign politics. The savage hatred of us, which breathes through the utterances of the Vatican press just now, may perhaps therefore, have its value to the Protestantism it seeks to destroy.

We need not go very far either, for if people would open their eyes and look around, in Israel Tarte they would see and know a "Papist" of the profoundest type.
