Death of Mrs. Boate.

After a lingering and painful sickness of twelve weeks Mrs. J. K. Boate died on Thursday Dec. 20. All that medical skill and loving care was able to do was of no avail. The funeral took place on Saturday Dec. 22. The casket left the residence of Mr. Boate proceeding to St. James Church where the solemn services for the burial of the dead took place. The coffin was placed in the chancel and the Rev. E. A. Langfield, read the service, and preached an impressive sermon on St. Matthew 24: 44. "Therefore be ye always ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh. The great theme of the discourse was readiness for death which could only be secured by having an interest in Christ and by having the heart renewed by the operation of the Holy Spirit. The preacher urged upon his hearers the necessity of taking heed to the exhortations of the gospel and to realize their relationship to God their Creator. He also spoke of the beautiful character of the deceased and of her firm trust and faith in the Redeemer. The funeral was largely attended by many friends of the departed. It was said that about 100 vehicles were in the procession. The Rev. E. A. Langfield and the Township and Omemees Village attended the funeral also. The departed was laid to rest in the Boate family lot in the Emily Cemetery. Mr. Boate has the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community in his sad bereavement.
