Japan has a national debt of \$257,000,000.

While not more than one-sixth of its area is arable, the soil is very productive where it can be utilized at all, and there it teems with every variety of AGRICULTURAL PRODUCT.

Tobacco, tea, potatoes, rice, and wheat are all grown; its floral kingdom is rich, beautiful, and varied; but its fruits though abundant are for the most part of poor quality. Japan has 2,652 miles of privately owned railways and 768 miles of Government lines, on wnich last year a net profit in the aggrega e was made of \$3,734,885.

Japan possesses an army of 300,-000 men, and her war with China cost about \$225,000,000, of which \$80,000,000 was repaid by indemnity. She has a well equipped navy manned by 19,000 men, and her mercantile marine is worthy of her

During the last fiscal year, Japan exported to the United Kingdom copper, curios, drugs, jute, silk (raw and manufactured), and straw plaits to the value of \$1,494,764, while 'during the same period her imports from the old country in alkali, arms, carriages, cotton yarn, cotton goods, machinery, metals, ships, and ship machinery, and woollens reached the value of \$8,649,101.
