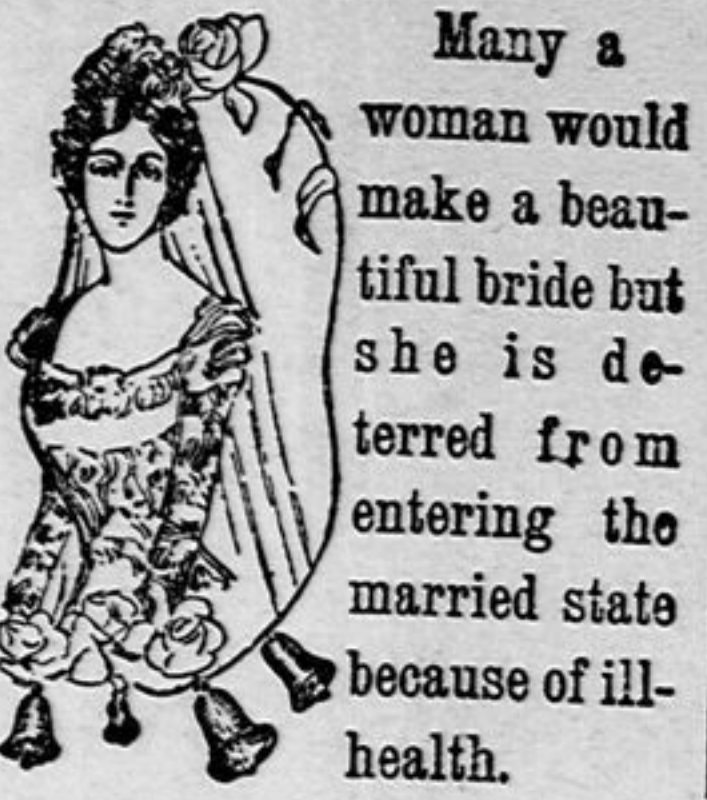


To Make a Bride

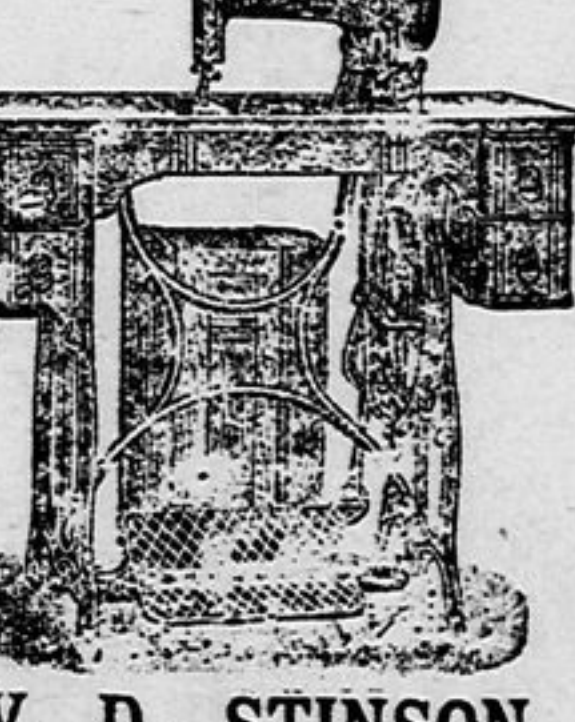
