### An Old Pioneer Gone.

Another of the pioneers of Cavan in the person of Robert Webster of Oakwood Ont., passed away on Sunday evening Dec. 10th in the eighty-third year of his age. Mr. Webster came to the township of Cavan in March 1823, with his parents and their family. They settled in the 13th con. now known as Mount Pleasant, where they endured all the hardships of a new country, he assisted in helping to clear three farms in that neighborhood. In later years he moved to the 2nd con. of Emily, married Miss E. Davidson and remained there until 1845, when he moved to the township of Mariposa. Shortly after his wife died leaving five small children, four boys and one girl. In 1849 he married Miss Margaret Henderson, who survives him with three sons and five daughters, altogether twelve children to mourn his loss. He was a kind father and husband and did well for his family. In early life he became religious and was for over sixty years a member of the Methodist church.
