Ottawa, Ont. Dec. 31, 1956—Instructor Commander George Charles Edward Gray, 42, of Millbrook, Ont., and Halifax, has been promoted from instructor lieutenant-commander in the half-yearly promotions list announced Dec. 31. He is on the instructional staff at the Educational Training School at HMCS Stadacona, RCN Barracks at Halifax. Instr. Cdr. Gray was born in Millbrook and taught school in this neighbourhood before he entered the navy in 1941. Since the war he has served in the cruisers Ontario and Uganda, and ashore on both coasts.

Instructor Gray is the youngest of a family of nine. Surviving members are Mrs. Russell Smith of Millbrook, Dr. Alvin Gray of Victoria, B.C., Mrs. Lloyd Acton of Detroit, Mich., and Henry Gray of Pieton, Ontario.

He was educated at Millbrook Public and High Schools and at Peterborough Normal School, and took summer courses at Western University, London, Ontario, where he obtained his B.A. degree, and also at Dalhousie University in Nova Scotia, where he obtained his M.A. degree.

He married the former Mary McKenzie of Windsor in which city he was principal of one of the Public Schools; has two children, Nancy and Marilyn 12 and 8 years of age respectively.

Civil Defence Expert Lectures to Police, Interest Here

One of Canada's top Civil Defence authorities Col. Charles L. Smith, Director of Operations and Training, Federal Defence will address the members of the Peterborough Police School at Queen Mary Auditorium, Peterborough, Wednesday, January 9th. The lecture was announced today by Chief John Naples, one of the organizers of the Police School.

Citizens of Peterborough and district, said Chief Naples, are becoming acutely aware of their position in the event of a national disaster such as an A-bomb attack on Toronto and this particular lecture is designed to bring all civil defence agencies up to date on new techniques and planning.

"Civil defence exercises are not new to Peterborough," added Chief Naples, "Our police force has assisted in several civil defence schemes and during mock attacks on Toronto Peterborough has been used as an evacuation centre for casualties."

Local civil defence authorities, stated Chief Naples, were to be complimented on their planning and efficiency in exercises organized by federal civil defence authorities.

The Peterborough police department is now in process of recruiting an auxiliary force who will receive full police training, especially in the control of traffic. Such auxiliary police will assist the regular police in the event of a national disaster affecting the Peterborough area.

Chief Naples cautioned that plans for effective operation of

a civil defence programme cannot be carried out efficiently unless all the organized agencies in each community receiving refugees or casualties know well in advance what their duties will be and prepare for them.

To illustrate the latest tactics of civil defence Col. Smith will show up to date films during his lecture. "Col. Smith will bring to the police school the latest plans and thinking of the federal civil defence organization," said Chief Naples. "We hope that everyone interested in or connected with this work will attend the lecture."

In addition to the regular attendance at the Police School by district police forces, Chief Naples stated that there was an open invitation to all members of district fire departments, Red Cross workers, members of St. John's Ambulance Corps and civil defence workers to attend the lecture. We would like to see a good turnout by the general public, said the Chief Constable.
