## Liquor Gets Majority Vote Over Beer. "Wets" Win Contest

Liquor won over beer by a 2 vote margin, and the "wets" over the "drys" by a big majority in last week's vote. It was expected the "wets" would win, but were not conceded such a big majority as they piled up. The vote showed that citizens as a whole regarded this as much more important than our Council from year to year, as it pulled a larger vote than any local Municipal election we know of. Now that the people have spoken, it remains to be seen whether the outlets will do all for Millbrook it was advertised to do.

Following are the results of the vote taken January 15th, 1958 under the Liquor Licence Act of the Province of Ontario:

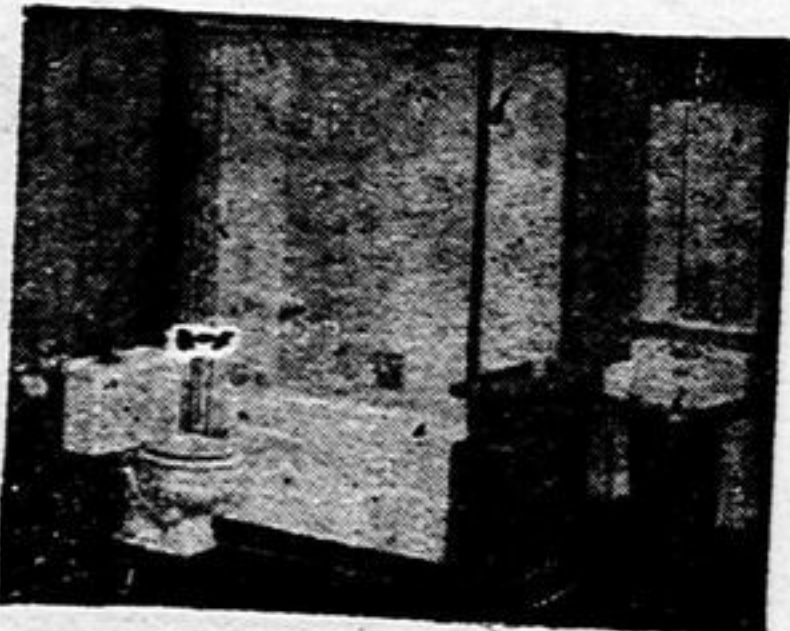
