

Inaugural Meeting Of Cavan Council

Millbrook, January 13, 1958
—The inaugural meeting of the Cavan Council was held on the above date in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, Millbrook, at 11 a.m.

The Clerk first administered the Oath of Office to the Reeve, then Deputy Reeve, and then the three Councillors. After subscribing to the oath of office the following took their seats, that is to say:
Reeve—Lloyd Hooton
Deputy Reeve—Harold Bradburn
Councillors—George Howden, Joseph Thorn, Joseph Burns.

The opening prayer and invocation for Divine guidance for the members of Council during the coming year was offered by Rev. Mr. Quinn of St. Thomas' Anglican Church, Millbrook. Rev. Mr. Huestin was also present.

The Reeve in his opening address thanked Rev. Mr. Quinn for being with us, also for the kind words of advice he had given them for 1958. The Reeve congratulated the Deputy Reeve on being elected by acclamation, also Councillor Howden on being returned to office, he also welcomed Councillor Thorn back after being out for a couple of years, also Mr. Burns a new comer to the Council this year. The Reeve asked for the co-operation of all the members for the coming year. The Reeve also welcomed Rev. Mr. Huestin to the opening of the Council, he made mention that Rev. Mr. Huestin was present at the opening in June of the new Municipal Building of the United Counties and gave the opening prayer.

Rev. Mr. Huestin congratulated the Reeve, Deputy Reeve and members of Council for the offices to which they had been severally elected for the coming year, and wished the best for each and everyone.

Deputy Reeve Bradburn congratulated the Reeve and Members of Council on being elected to office for another term, he trusted they would all work together for the best interest of the ratepayers.

Councillors Howden, Thorn and Burns all congratulated the other members of Council for being returned to office, and all hoped for the best for 1958.

Minutes of the last meeting read. On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn-Councillor G. Howden that minutes be adopted as read. Carried.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn-Councillor Howden that we adjourn for lunch until 1.30 p.m.

Council resumed at 1.30 p.m. with all members present, Reeve L. A. Hooton in the chair.

Mr. M. Todd addressed the Council asking permission to cut a tree that was in the road of Hydro line that was being built down to his place. Mr. Todd offered to cut the tree down, and would be responsible for same.

On motion of Councillors Thorn-Burns that permission be given Mr. Todd to cut the tree down. Carried.

Lord, re record of payment of 1956 boundary account. Wilmott-Irvine, enclosing copy of letter sent to R. Baton. Dept. of Highways, re additional grant to road 476. Dept. of Highways, under the new system we will receive amount of money approved before we set up our 1958 By-law.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Howden that membership fee in the Ontario Good Roads Association be sent, also Ont. Association of Rural Municipalities. Carried.

On motion of Councillors Thorn-Burns that the Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Road Supt. be delegates to the Ont. Good Roads Convention, and any other members who wished to go. Carried.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Howden that the Clerk and Reeve be the delegates to the Ont. Association of Rural Municipalities on Feb. 17-18 and any other member of Council who wished to go, could do so. Carried.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Thorn that correspondence be received and filed. Carried.

A delegation consisting of Elmer Hogg and Joe Thompson approached the Council re a grant to be used for the promotion of junior hockey in the community.

On motion of Councillors Howden and Burns that we give a grant of \$25.00 to help junior hockey in the community. Carried.

Mr. Lillioe from the area of North Monaghan School Board and Mr. Birkin Public School Inspector addressed the Council re approval of building a four room school at an approximate cost of \$80,000.00 in the North Monaghan Area.

Considerable discussion arose re the present rates which that part of Cavan, which was in that area were paying. The Reeve and members of Council felt that same should be equalized this year, also U.S.S. No. 16 had asked to have theirs equalized this year.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Howden that this Council give tentative approval re the building of a four room school at approximately cost of \$80,000.00 in the North Monaghan Area. Carried.

On motion of Councillor Howden and Deputy Reeve Bradburn for the Assessor Mr. Elson to get in touch with the Assessors of North Monaghan and Manvers for equalizing of U.S.S. No. 16, and 17 1/2 North Monaghan Area. Carried.

Mr. T. G. Shield the County Assessor was present, he congratulated the Reeve, Deputy Reeve and members of Council for being elected to the different offices, and hoped they would have a good term.

The Reeve took up with Mr. Shield re the equalizing of the Durham District H.S. district, this Council felt it should be done this year.

Mr. A. V. Thorn collector of rates gave his report for the year as follows:

On motion of Councillor Howden and Burns that report be received and filed. Carried.

The Treasurer gave an itemized account of receipts and expenditures for the year.

On motion of Councillor Thorn and Deputy Reeve Bradburn that Clerks report be received and filed. Carried.

The Reeve appointed the following Committees:

Councillor Thorn-Howden on printing committee. Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Burns, cedar and bridges.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Howden that the same fence viewers be appointed for 1958 as follows:

Edwin Eagleson, Walter Widjis, R. O. Larmer, Ray Staples, Lloyd Sutton, Bruce Sharpe, Herb Snyder, Hubert Lowes, Wilbert Bryans, Lorne Farrow.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Burns that the same pound keepers be appointed for 1958, carried as follows:—Ronald Gibson, L. W. Smith, H. Hubbard, Wm Parker, A. Matchett, Donald Lang, Fred Elliott, Dannie Nil, N. Fee and M. McGee.

The following division of roads was allotted to the different members of Council as follows:—Councillor Thorn, Div. 1, Con. 1, 2, 3. Councillor Burns, Div. 2, Con. 4, 5, 6. Deputy Reeve Bradburn, Div. 3, Con. 7, 8 and half of 1/4 line. Councillor Howden, Div. 4, Con. 10, 11 and half of 1/4 line. Reeve L. A. Hooton, Div. 5, Con. 12, 13, 14 and Emily boundary.

On motion of Councillor Howden and Deputy Reeve Bradburn that the Clerk introduce certain By-laws.

The Clerk introduced the following By-laws:

Money By-law, to borrow certain monies from the Toronto Dominion Bank, and a By-law to appoint certain officers.

On motion of Councillors Burns and Thorn that we go into committee of the whole for second reading, with blanks filled in as follows:

That we borrow up to \$30,000. Appointing Hubert Lowes as school attendance officer at a salary of \$35. per year. Valuator of animals killed, L. W. Smith and H. Jamieson. Medical indigent officer, Dr. M. E. Hobbs.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Thorn committee rose and resumed. By-laws read a third time, signed sealed and numbered 988, 989. The following accounts were presented:
