MR. RAY BOTHWELL NEW U.C. WARDEN

Cobourg—Late Tuesday afternoon, January 21st. Reeve T. Ray Bothwell of South Monaghan, Township was elected Warden of the United Counties Council for 1958. He replaces Lloyd Hooton, Cavan, who was Warden in 1957 when the United Counties Council moved to its new building.

Ray Bothwell was elected to office on the fifth ballot of the second nomination. His nominees were Wilfred Carruthers, Bowmanville, and Michal Wladyska, Port Hope. In the final count, Ray Bothwell received 27 votes; David Dingwall, reeve of Cramhae Township, 16, and O. J. Robbins, reeve of Alnwick Township, 7.

In order to possess an overall majority, Ray Bothwell had to receive 26 votes which he failed to get in 11 previous ballots to the final one.

The new Warden will be taking office when the United Counties Council will be engaged in the building of a new wing to the Home for the Aged and face increasing unemployment and the constant demand for the reduction of taxes.

11 Years' Experience

The owner of an electrical business in Fraserville, the new Warden has had considerable experience in Municipal affairs. He has had 11 years practical experience for six of which he has been Reeve of South Monaghan. He has served four years on the United Counties Council and was chairman of the roads commission. In 1956 he was chairman of the legislative and by-laws committee and in 1957 chairman of the roads and bridges committee.

The new Warden is married, the father of two children and is a member of the Fraserville United Church, the Fraserville Cemetery Board, the Masonic Order and he is past deputy grand master of the IOOF District 44.

Shortly after the election, which took most of Tuesday afternoon's activities, the Council adjourned until Wednesday morning.—Examiner.
