It seems the name of the pedler with the bulldog, who stole the horse, was Partrage, who it is said, has won \$50 recently with his bulldog fighting a match in Toronto.

When Mr. Berry and the constable first waited on Forsyth, he admitted that he had a horse that he believed was stolen and allowed them to take it quietly away, but after Mr. Berry had parted with the officer, Forsyth and a brother attempted to take the anamil away from him. A second alarm was accordingly sounded to call the brigade or part of them back from the first fire. The firemen were not long in returning, but no second fire could be discovered. 


