A TERRIBLE OCCURRENCE.

A Young Man Burned to Death in Lindsay.

Following close upon the the deplorable fatality in Fenelon township last week, when three lives were lost in a burning building, we have this week to report a similar fatality in our very midst, and it is needless to state that the whole community has been shocked and saddened by the sad event. Tuesday morning about 4.30 o'clock fire broke out in the upper portion of Mr. Wm. Walters' residence, east ward, being discovered by a member of the family. The alarm was at once given and the firemen were speedily on the spot, but the house, being a frame structure, burned with incredible fierceness, and though the water service was excellent it was soon evident that the building could not be saved. In the meantime the neighbors who had gathered, busied themselves in getting out the effects on the ground floor, most of which were saved in a somewhat damaged condition. Notwithstanding that the upper storey and part of the lower was all ablaze Wm. and Thos. Walters essayed another trip through the smoke to save some pictures in the dining room. As they were about to retrace their steps by the way they had entered they heard a crash, being crushed by the falling chimney and part of the ceiling. Soon the building was reduced to a heap of ruins, and the people dispersed to their homes little dreaming that a human form lay blackening in the fiery furnace. Among those present at the fire were Mr. John Martin and his son Joshua, a young man seventeen years of age, employed in the store of Mr. M. J. Carter. Young Martin had been very active in carrying out effects, and when his father reached home and found that his son had not arrived a horrible fear seized him as he recalled that Mr. Walters mentioned that someone was in the room when he entered, but supposed whoever it was in the room went through the hall. He at once went back and informed the firemen of his fears. No one had seen the boy, and a search amid the ruins was at once instituted, with the result that the charred remains were speedily uncovered. The head, hands and feet were burned off, the heat had been so intense. The poor fellow was a general favorite, and was greatly liked by his employer, Mr. Carter, who sent a beautiful wreath to be placed on the coffin. The funeral took place on Friday to Riverside cemetery. Mr. Walters' loss on the building is about \$750, and on the furniture \$1,000; the insurance is \$500 and \$700 respectively.

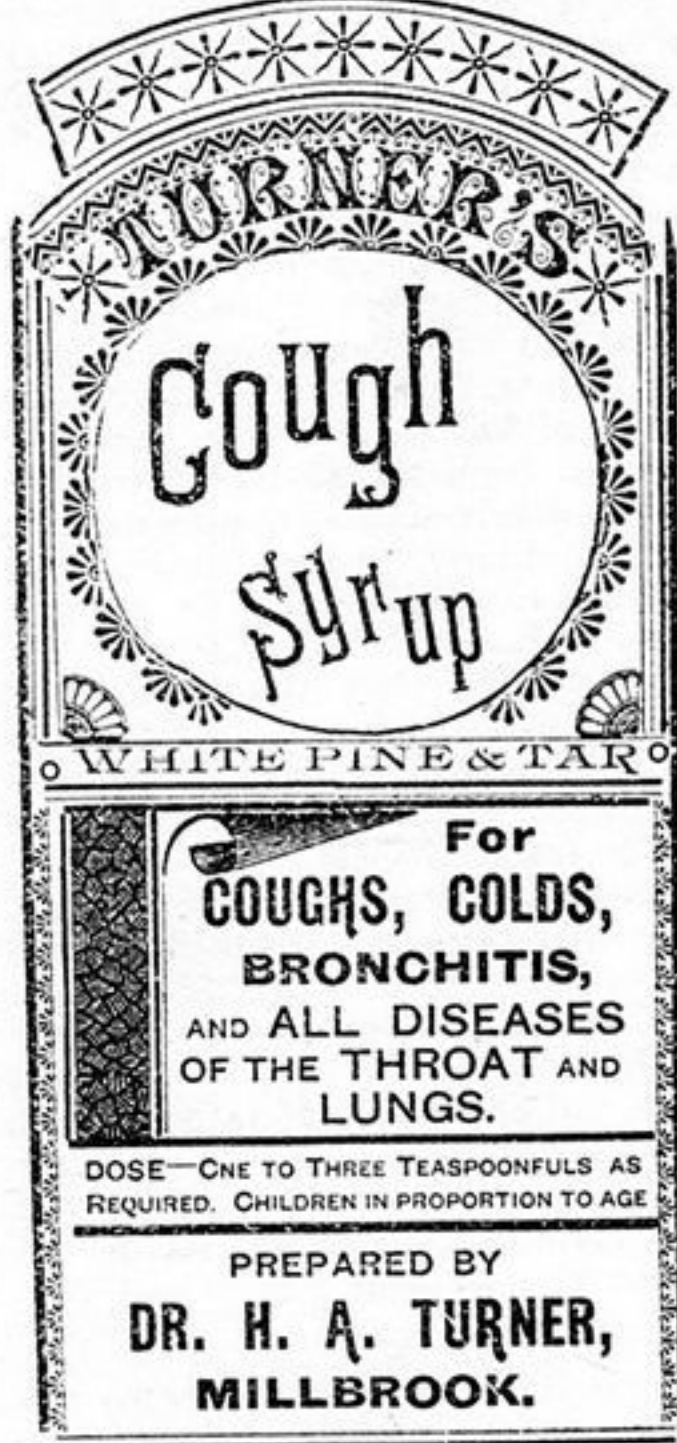
