CAVAN COUNCIL.

The New Council at the Helm—A Number of Important Communications Were Read—Reports of Committees and General Business.

The members elect of the municipal council of the corporation of the Township of Cavan for the year 1894, met at eleven o'clock, a.m., on Monday, the 15th day of January, instant, in accordance with the municipal laws of the Province of Ontario, and after making and subscribing their respective declarations of qualification and of office before the clerk took their seats in council as follows, viz: Joseph Thorndyke, Esquire, as Reeve, Wm. T. Donaldson, Esquire, as Deputy Reeve and Messrs. Charles McNeil, Richard Coe and Robert Hootan as councillors. The reeve in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting of the old council were read and confirmed.

Communications were read from Messrs. David Fallis, John W. Whitfield and John E. Sanderson, all applying for the office of assessor. From the Single Tax Association enclosing a petition which they asked to be signed by the reeve and clerk, and forward to the Local Legislature, and from the Municipal World, St. Thomas, soliciting subscriptions for said journal, all of which were on motion laid on table.

Mr. Donaldson reported that he had settled the accounts between Cavan and South Monaghan and that there was a balance due South Monaghan on 31st December, 1893, of 28.16.

Councillor Coe reported going out to enquire into the condition of Mr. Richard McBrien and wife, indigents. He found the old lady suffering from dropsy and unable to help herself. Mr. McBrien was in fairly good health but unable to wait on his wife. He had arranged with their adopted daughter to remain with them until the 25th instant, and had engaged a woman to go to the house daily, to do up the work etc. for \$2.00 per month; also that while out at said McBrien's he had examined the wood which Mr. Robert Hootan had delivered there and for which Mr. Hootan had been paid the sum of \$18.75 or \$3.75 per cord, at the last meeting of the old council as several parties had complained to him that Mr. Hootan had not delivered either the quantity or quality of wood paid for. He found a number of logs there, cut out of dead trees, and upon measuring same found that there was a little over three cords, about one quarter cord of which was cut and split, ready for use. But he had also been informed that one or more of said logs had been delivered there by another person. He had asked the McBrien's if Mr. Hootan had delivered any other wood during the last few months and they replied, only some tamarac wood which they had paid Mr. Hootan \$2.00 per cord for out of the money which had been granted them by the council. Mr. Hootan had stated at the last meeting of the council that he had delivered to said McBrien's five cords of first class dry hardwood, cut and split ready for the stove. He regretted to have to make this report, but he felt that it was his duty to do so and he thought that Mr. Hootan should either deliver the wood

as represented or he should refund the money to the council. He would not give more than \$2.50 per cord for the wood delivered by Mr. Hootan, in fact it was hardly worth that, he hoped Mr. Hootan would be able to explain the matter to the satisfaction of the council.

Mr. Hootan said there was three cords of wood at McBrien's which had been delivered by him and he had also delivered to them two cords during last summer and fall (besides the tamarac referred to which had been paid for) making in all five cords. He had had the first two cords cut and split into firewood, ready for the stove, and intended to have the remainder thereof cut and split the same as the first. Regarding the two first cords delivered by him, he had an explanation to make. Two of his neighbors and himself had agreed to deliver, without charge therefore, two cords of wood each to the said McBrien's. He had delivered his as per agreement, but after he had done so, the others positively refused to carry out their agreement. As he did not want to be fooled by them, he had asked the council to pay him for it along with the other wood. He hoped this explanation be satisfactory.

On motion the council adjourned at 1.30 p.m.

The council resume. Members all present. The reeve presiding.

Coun. McNeil introduced a by-law to appoint certain officers for the Township of Cavan for the present year, which after passing through its several stages was signed and sealed.

Messrs. Geo. Campbell, M.P.P. and Robt. Vance were appointed auditors at a salary of \$9.00 each. Mr. David Fallis was appointed assessor at a salary of \$100.00 without extras and Mr. C. Twamley was appointed collector at a salary of \$130.00, without extras.

On motion of Councillor Coe, seconded by Mr. Donaldson, Messrs. James McLean, John J. McGill and Thomas McCamus to gether with the reeve and clerk (who are members ex-officio) be appointed members of the Board of Health for the present year and that Dr. H. Turner be re-appointed medical health officer.

Moved by Councillor Coe, seconded by Councillor McNeil that the reeve be a committee to examine into the validity and sufficiency of the treasurers bonds. Carried. Moved by Mr. Donaldson, seconded by Councillor Coe, that the deputy returning officers who officiated at the prohibition plebiscite vote be paid as follows, viz: For personal services \$3.00 each, poll clerk \$2.00; constable \$1.00, and for polling booth \$2.00. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Donaldson, seconded by Councillor McNeil, that the clerk be instructed to order one copy of the Municipal World for 1894, for filing in his office. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Donaldson, seconded by Councillor Coe, that the sum of \$5.00 per month be granted for the relief of Mr. Richard McBrien and wife, indigent, that the money so granted be placed in the hands of Mr. Thomas McIndoo, to be expended by him to the best advantage in purchasing necessities for said indigents, that the grant be continued during the pleasure of the council, and that the allowance for January and February be paid now, as the said indigents were out of provisions at the present. Carried.

A number of orders were issued on the treasurer and the council adjourned to meet again on Friday, the 16th day of February, next at 10.30 a.m.

OMENEE.

There is quite an opposition between our omnibus drivers here. Mr. Larmer is doing a rushing business, he had a passenger this week, and we are informed he has the promise of another next week. Persevere Will, you must come off more than conqueror.

Our trustees have engaged Mr. Sheppard of Hamilton as assistant high school teacher. Mr. Orr, the former assistant, resigned his position on account of ill health. Great sympathy is felt for Mr. Orr, as he was one of the best teachers who ever taught here. During his seven years teaching he sent out a great number of teachers who all look back and regard his instructions as the cause of their success.

We are sorry to announce the death of Mr. Arthur McQuade, ex-M. P. The deceased, who was 76 years of age, is one of our oldest settlers. Mr. McQuade, who has been for some time ailing, partially recovered and was again able to be about. On Friday he was smitten by an apoplectic stroke which rendered him speechless and almost unconscious, in which state he remain until Sunday about 9 p.m., when he passed away. The deceased leaves a wife, four sons and three daughters. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m., and was conducted by the Orangemen of which society Mr. McQuade had long been a member.

Mr. Sam Hughes paid our town a visit today. Sam is looking well in spite of the rough handling he received some days ago.
