COUNTY COUNCIL.

Reeve Owen of Campbellford Elected Warden—Ferguson, Thorndyke, Donaldson, Preston, Vance and Barnicutt prominent on Committees.

C. L. Owen, Reeve of Campbellford, elected warden, our Reeve and those of the townships take prominent places on the committees.

On Tuesday of last week the council of the united counties met at Cobourg and at 7.30 p. m. forty-nine members answered to their names at the call of the clerk, after which nominations for warden were recorded. The contest lay between Reeves Gunyo of Brighton and Owen of Campbellford. On the first ballot Gunyo took 17 votes and Owen 13, with other Reeve following in the wake of Owen. After a number of ballots had been taken, Owen was elected by 30 to 19 and conducted to his seat by his mover and seconded.

Mr. Owen addressed the council briefly, thanking them for the unexpected honor and asking that they should not expect too much from him.

Messrs. Fowlds, Preston and Underwood were scrutineers and ably attended the tedious work.

On motion of Messrs. Doyle and Mitchell, all the Reeves of the various minor municipalities were appointed a committee for the ensuing year.

Mr. McCallum gave notice that he would move the Council into Committee of the whole to consider a motion for a more equitable basis of taxation.

The council adjourned at 10.30 to meet again on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mr. J. J. Preston, Reeve of Manvers, was appointed chairman of the committee to strike the standing committees.

On Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock the special committee appointed to strike the various standing committees met, Mr. Preston in the chair.

The Council met on Wednesday at 3 p. m. The warden read his address. He gave a warm welcome to the new members, especially those from Port Hope. He pointed out the business that would come before the council. High School Trustees would have to be appointed. A committee was to be appointed to enquire into the validity of the Treasurer's sureties, in accordance with the act. The assets were \$67,000 and the expenditures \$66,000. There was a balance of \$1,316.38. It was small owing to the fact that all the expenses of the Narrows bridge, which was recently completed, had all been paid. He pointed out that it was necessary to have full returns of all lands in arrears for taxes. He sincerely thanked the council for the great honor they had conferred upon him.

Port Hope's delegates to the county parliament were then introduced and cordially welcomed.

Messrs. Ferguson and Richards moved that the Grand Trunk authorities be communicated with with a view to obtain reduced rates for the councilors on the railway. It was pointed out that the G. T. R. formerly favored the councilors.

The Council met at 7.30 Wednesday evening when considerable discussion took place in regard to the arbitration between the township of Seymour and the United Counties of a bridge.

ON LEGISLATURE—Jos. Thorndyke Reeve of Cavan.

ON ADVISORY BOARD—Alex. Ferguson, Reeve of Millbrook, Chairman, and Jos. Thorndyke of Cavan.
