## COUNTIES COUNCIL.

### General Business.

The Warden took the chair at 7.30, on Thursday evening.

Mr. McCallum and Mr. Preston moved that steps be taken towards a more equitable equalization of the rolls of the municipalities of the counties.

Mr. McCallum pointed out the inequality of the equalization of the various municipalities, claiming that while many townships in Durham paid county rates on the full value of their assessment, the townships of Northumberland paid rates on much less than their assessment. He quoted figures to bear out his statement, and said the villages of Northumberland were specially favored as against those of Durham. There were three ways of remedying the evil; appealing to the County Judge; an award of three arbitrators; and a settlement by the whole council. He favored the last mentioned mode.

Mr. Preston said at the special meeting of the reeves for this very purpose last summer every proposition to alter the system of payment of county rate was voted down. In Manvers the people suffer a great injustice, and if something was not done at once they would set the legal machinery in motion to get their rights. Manvers was assessed for \$900,000, yet was equalized at \$1,180,000. The township was equalized at more than the land would sell for.

Mr. Allen said the assessment in Bowmanville was too high. A property assessed there at \$600,000 had sold for \$390,000.

Mr. Mitchell said that Hamilton was not equally assessed, and was paying too much into the county funds. The county assessment was \$42 per acre, which was \$12 more than the assessment should be.

After some further discussion the motion carried.

Mr. Doyle and Mr. Fowlds moved an important resolution which will have the effect of cutting down expenditure on committee work. The resolution stated that whereas a large outlay in committee work was necessary in recent years owing to the building of bridges, and whereas it was likely that little of such work would be necessary in future, resolved that the treasurer shall pay for no committee work until the pay list are presented to and passed by the finance committee, and approved in committee of the whole.

Some objection was taken to the members thus being put to personal expense and having to wait several months before being recompensed, but the motion carried almost unanimously.

Mr. McKee presented report on the treasurer's bond, which was approved.

On motion of Mr. Ferguson the counties' solicitor, Mr. Holland, was retained in the matter of the Seymour arbitration re bridges over 100 feet long.

Mr. Carlaw presented report of the Road and Bridge Committee, which stated the total cost of the Narrows' bridge to be \$15,604, of which Seymour had paid \$4,680, and the counties had a claim against the Dominion Government for \$11,834.

Mr. Underwood presented report of the County Property Committee, which recommended: accepted of R. May's tender for wood at \$3.90 per cord; the placing of another telephone in the sheriff's office; and that necessary repairs to the council chamber be made.

Several members objected to making any extensive repairs, other than what were necessary to seat the Port Hope representatives.

The chairman said it was not the intention of the committee to spend \$500 or \$600, but to make only necessary repairs. He thought his long Presbyterian face would be a guarantee against extravagance.

Mr. Allen rose to a point of order. He did not approve of religion being slandered by the chairman saying he had a Presbyterian face. (Laughter.)

Mr. McCallum. The point of order is well taken. (Laughter.)

Mr. Fowlds. If Mr. Allen wants to speak for the Presbyterians, he ought to get a certificate of character himself. (Laughter.)

Mr. Preston. Is that the only way the chairman can get a certificate of character, by representing himself a Presbyterian? (Laughter.)

A motion to limit the expense to \$20 was carried.

APPOINTMENT OF COUNTY OFFICERS.

Mr. Mitchell said he was surprised that no report was to be submitted from the Legislative Committee on the subject discussed before that committee. Many recommendations in the interest of the county were made, and yet no report was forthcoming.

Mr. Gunyo explained that all the subjects discussed in committee had been reported upon, and recommendations forwarded to the Ontario Government, at a previous session. Hence he did not consider it was necessary to present a report. He would do so, however, if the members of the committee wished.

Mr. Preston said there were seventeen new members this year who had a right to express their opinion as well as those who did so last year. He wanted the report presented.

Mr. Mitchell said the recommendation that county officials should be appointed by those who pay them, should be reported upon.

The council went into committee of the whole on the communications laid before the Legislative Committee, the chairman in the chair.

The committee decided to take no action as to reduction of officials' fees; to petition in favor of the reduction of the number of county councillors; to petition to have railway fares reduced; and to petition the Ontario Government to grant power to county councils to appoint all official paid by the county. The latter recommendation was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Stuart and Mr. Fowlds moved that a house of refuge be erected by the counties. Motion lost, 24 to 16. The Port Hope and Hamilton township representatives voted nay; the Hope and Haldimand representatives yea.

The council adjourned at 12 o'clock noon. Continued next week.

## MILLBROOK COUNCIL.

Council met at 7.30 p.m. in the Town Hall, on February 5th, 1894, pursuant to a call from the Reeve. Members present, the Reeve and councillors Clarke, Richardson and Pickup. Minutes were read and on motion confirmed.

A by-law appointing Mr. W. T. Wood, treasurer, at a salary of \$30.00 per year without extras was passed and also a by-law appointing finance viewers.

Mr. John Gillott was heard before the council and requested that the charge for the town hall for the late temperance lectures be made as reasonable as possible. On motion the charge was reduced to \$3.00 for the two nights.

A tender from Mr. Reid Lowery, offering to supply cord wood for town hall at \$3.50 per cord, and one from Mr. R. Falls at \$3.85, were received, read and on motion laid on the table.

A communication from Mr. John Armstrong was received, offering to light the lamps at 8c. each per night.

On motion Mr. Armstrong's tender was accepted on the understanding that nothing but the best American oil be used and the contract held good during the pleasure of the council.

Moved by Councillor Bateson, seconded by Councillor Richardson, that in view of the manner that express parcels are handled by the company here, resolved that the clerk be authorized to communicate with the company and request them to take into their favourable consideration the prayer of the petition of the business men of the village. Carried.

On motion the collector's time for returning his roll was extended to the 1st Monday in March, inclusive.

On motion the Reeve and treasurer were authorized to borrow \$1000.00 to pay the teachers' salary now past due.

Councillor Bateson gave notice that he would at next meeting of council bring in a by-law to amend by-law to license livery stables and also a by-law to define amount of tavern and shop licenses for this year.

Councillor Richardson was appointed to take charge of the lamp lighting for this month.

On motion Mr. Robert Lackey was heard before the council, and requested that he receive a rebate on his tax bill, on the

grounds that part of land amended to him was taken from him in opening Cavan street. Councillor Bateson moved that Mr. Lackey receive a rebate of \$1.00. The motion not being received, fell through.

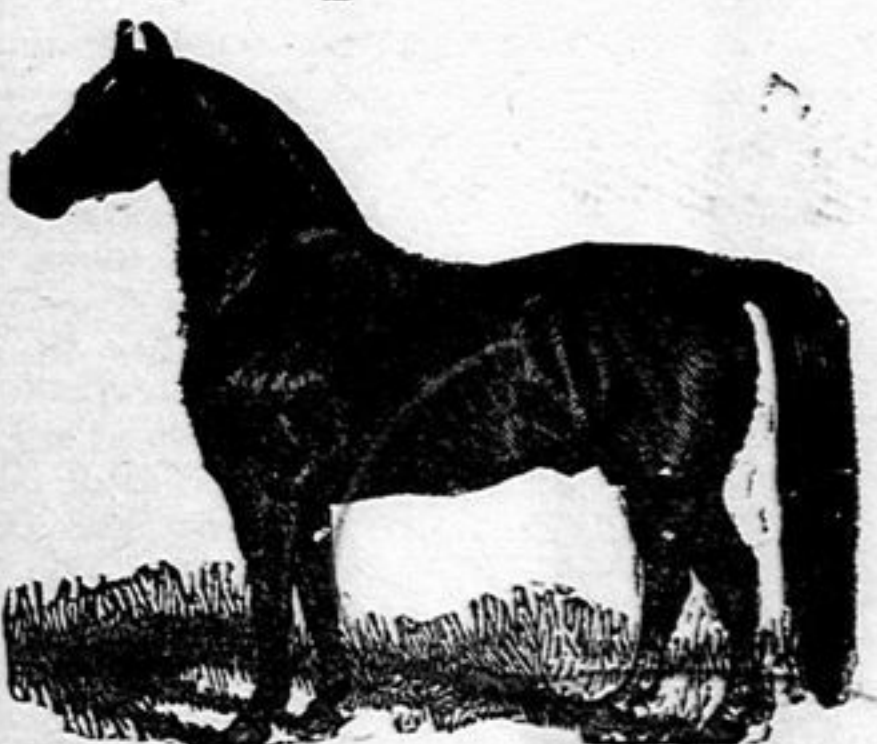
