Explosion of a Lamp Causes an \$80,000 Fire at Port Hope-The Boys All Safe.

Port Hope, Feb. 11.--Trinity College School was burned Saturday night. The alarm was sounded a few minutes before 12. A terrific gale was blowing from the west and it was some time before help arrived. The fire, which originated in the tower in the west wing, is supposed to have been caused by the expression of a lamp, and the flames fanned by the high wind, swept completely through the building. The firemen were very much handicapped, as one of the pipes of the waterworks had bursted during the severe frost of the last few days. Line of men were formed and buckets of water handed along. 
