STANDING VOTE FOR UNITY RESULT FROM FARMERS DISCUSSION

A decisive victory for unity was the outcome of a panel discussion between representatives of the Farmers' Union and the Durham Federation of Agriculture when 200 farm people assembled in the Cavan Community Hall on Thursday evening to hear the two factions argue to the finish in a battle of words.

At the conclusion of the meeting the resolution was almost unanimously endorsed by a standing vote concurring with the Durham Federation of Agriculture to form one strong overall organization.

Clarence Allin, of Newcastle, president of the Durham Federation of Agriculture, introduced Mansell Stacey, teacher of agricultural science in Bowmanville High School, who acted as impartial chairman of the panel.

Spokesmen for the Federation were Garnet Rickard, Newcastle, past president of Federation; Harvey Malcolm, Yelverton, Director from Manvers Township; Dick Bowles, Nestle-

ton, President of Federation. The Farmers' Union was represented by Doug Mackie, Blackstock, President County Union; Lou Wood, Bowmanville, Ennisville Union; Vic Malcolm, Caesarea, Director County Union.

Parity Pricing

Dealing with the parity pricing the principal difference of opinion appeared to lie in the fact that the Farmers' Union demand 100 per cent parity as a floor over which the market price would fluctuate according to supply and demand. Moreover this formula would apply to agricultural products produced, marketed and consumed in Canada.

The Federation panelists were not happy with this point of view, even though they felt higher prices were desirable. Their contention was that this would enforce controlled production, which many farmers do not want and which is undesirable for some products. They did not believe 100% parity could be achieved without creating over-production and they claimed it is not practical.

Government Floor Price

Mr. Rickard pointed out that floor prices were never designed to be adequate, and Mr. Makin countered that floor prices are not directed at the farmer but rather as a protection to the trade.

Legislation Unsound

Harvey Malcolm expressed the overall feeling of the panel that farmers are not yet using their marketing legislation to any appreciable extent, and there is little reason to be embarrassed over the government help when it is merited.

Quoting from a statement by the Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture, that

farmers must put up a united front or be content to become second rate peasants, Garnet Rickard likened the farmers to one side of a baseball team with the other segments of the economy out in the field.

In the final analysis all agreed with the Rev. Mr. Larke who said from the floor that the things that kept us together are greater than the things that kept us apart.

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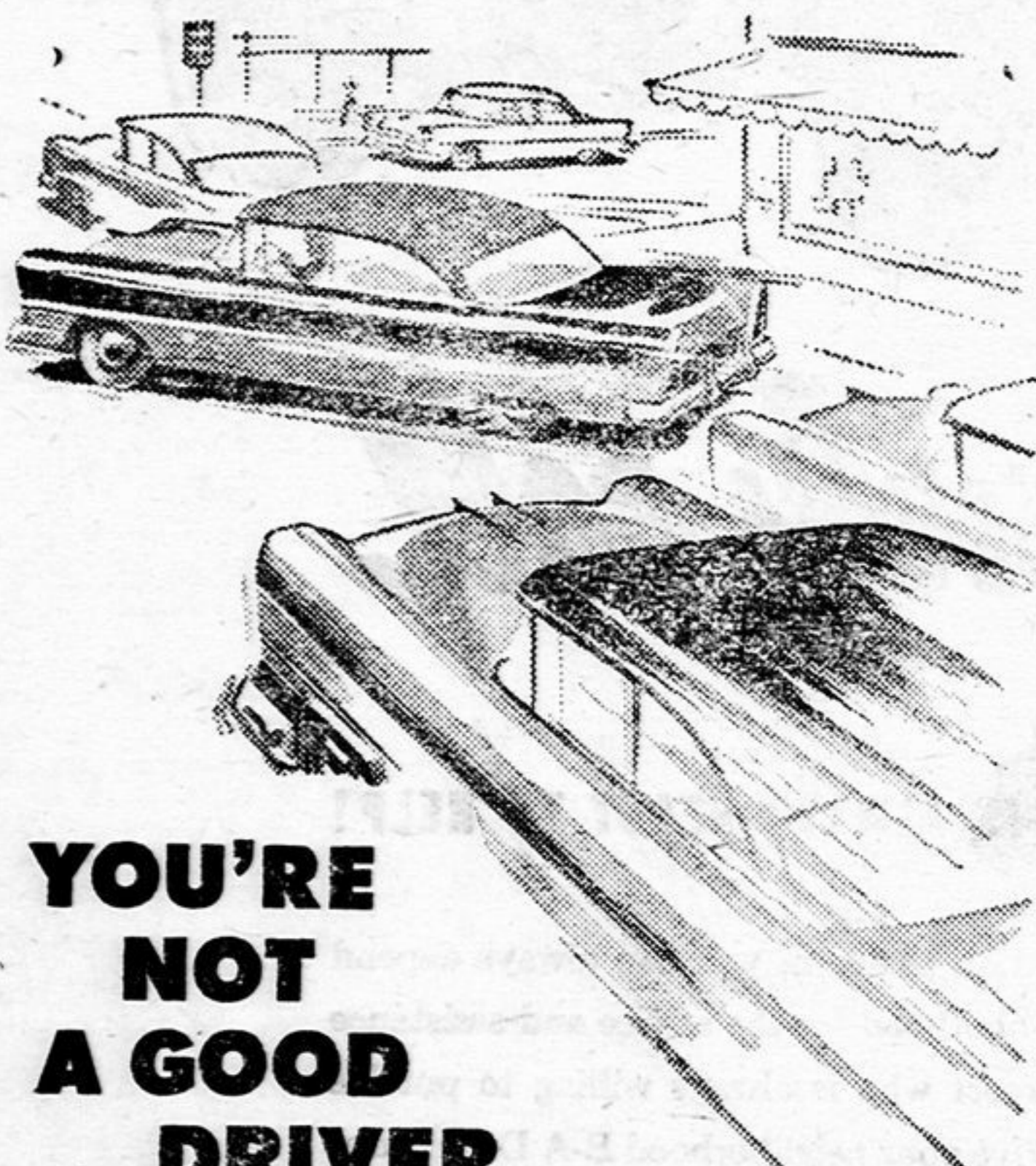
