Farewell Given Local Boy

Dr. Thomas N. Belch, M.D., first medical and overseas missionary from Durham County, left today for New York from where he will sail this week with his wife on the S.S. Flying Cloud, Isbrandsten Company Dutch Line, for Beirut, Lebanon.

Dr. Belch is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Nathaniel Belch of Millbrook. A son of the farm he attended public school on the Falls line and the Millbrook High School. In February 1943 he joined the 48th Highlanders of Toronto, went overseas in September and spent fifteen months in the Italian campaign and in north west Europe. After returning from war service he attended the University of Toronto and graduated in medicine in 1953. He was president of the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship and active in Knox College while at University. He interned at the Toronto East General Hospital, was in general practice at Harrow, Ont., and served in the hospital in Kirkland Lake.

Mrs. Belch, nee Marilyn Goddard, was born in Alliston, and has lived with her parents for many years in Toronto. A graduate of Humboldt College and the Toronto East General Hospital, she is a graduate nurse.

Both Dr. and Mrs. Belch have studied at the Toronto Bible College, and have taken the Intermission Candidate Training Program at Detroit, Michigan under The Evangelical Alliance Mission. The Mission has over seven hundred missionaries in eighteen countries. They were married in Hart House chapel, Toronto on November 12th, 1955, by Rev. H. H. Kent.

Dr. and Mrs. Belch were commissioned at the evening service in the Peoples Church, Toronto on February 10th. Dr. Belch is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and Grace congregation, Millbrook where his father is an elder. At the service in Grace Church last night he spoke briefly, and he was honoured by the congregation at a social hour in the Church Hall. An address was read by Joseph H. Burns, Clerk of the Session, and Ernest L. Armstrong, one of the elders presented Dr. Belch with a purse on behalf of the congregation. Rev. W. H. Heustin, the minister, led in the singing of hymns with Miss Augusta Clarry at the piano. The minister emeritus, Rev. Walter Patterson, spoke of Dr. Belch's fine character. Refreshments were served by the ladies.

Last Thursday at the Hour of Power at the manse in Millbrook, those who have attended the weekly prayer meeting and Bible Study along with members of the Ministerial Association and their wives presented Dr. Belch with a purse. Mrs. Heustin was assisted in serving refreshments by Mrs. H. C. Quinn of the rectory and Mrs. Tom Skipp, Jr.

Notice

The Municipal Council of the Village has directed me to bring to the attention of our citizens, the necessity of warning their children, from time to time, of the danger involved in crossing lines of traffic without first looking either way to see that the way is clear. Sometimes frost and rain can bring about hazardous conditions within minutes, therefore it becomes necessary that we become more cautious this time of year so that so called accidents may be avoided.

Regarding the removal of Snow, Ice, Dirt or other obstructions from off our Sidewalks, I will quote form the following By-Law No. 418 which was passed in Council on the 12th day of April 1915 A.D. Section 1, That the owner or occupant of house, dwelling, shop, store or place of business, or the owner or tenant of vacant property within the Corporation of the Village of Millbrook, shall remove or cause to be removed, all snow, ice, dirt or other obstructions from off the sidewalks adjoining his, her or their premises or property within, in twenty-four hours after the storm has ceased.

Section 3, That the owner or occupant of house, dwelling, shop, store or place of business or the owner or tenant of vacant property, neglecting to have the snow, ice, dirt or other obstructions removed within the time prescribed by clause one of this By-law, shall upon conviction of such offence before one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace or Police Magistrate having jurisdiction in the said Village of Millbrook in the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham, for each and every offence liable to, shall pay a penalty or fine of any sum not exceeding Five Dollars to be received by distress as in ordinary cases and in default of sufficient distress such person or persons shall be committed to the common Jail of the United Counties for a term not to exceed Ten Days, unless such fine and costs shall be sooner paid.

This By-Law is still in effect in the Corporation of the Village of Millbrook.
