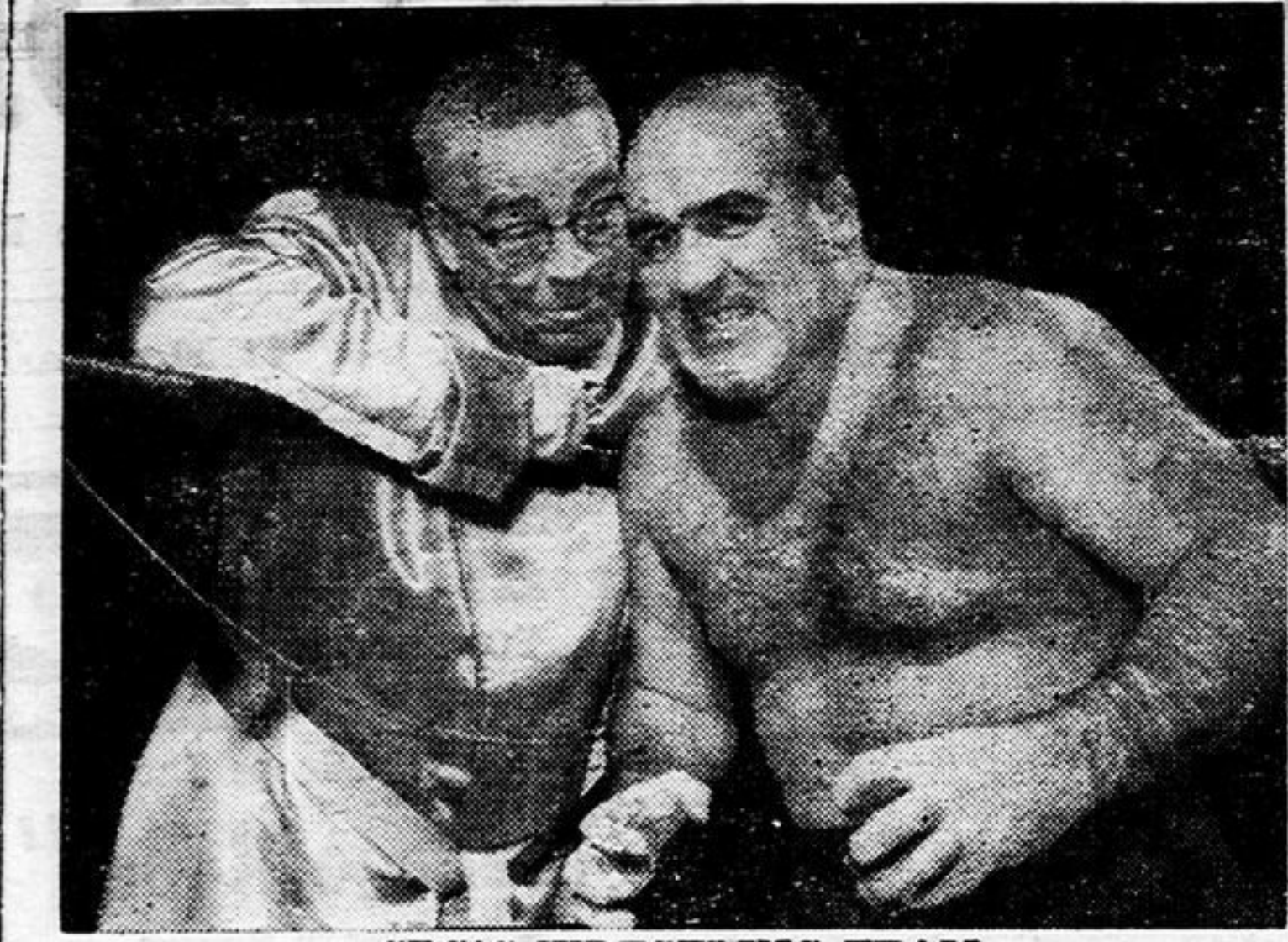

On motion of Councillors Bradburn and Cathcart the same ones be appointed as fence viewers for 1957. Carried: As follows: Edwin Eagleston, Walter Widdis, R. O. Larmer, Ray St a p l e s, Lloyd Sutton, Bruce Sharpe, Herb Snyder, Hubert Lowes, Wilbert Bryans, Lorne Farrow.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McKnight and Councillor Howden, the same pound keepers be reappointed for 1957 as follows: Ronald Gibson, L. W. Smith, H. Hubbard, Wm. Parker, A. Matchett, Donald Lang, Fred Elliott, Dannie Nill, Gordon Finney, N. Fee and M. McGee.

On motion of Councillors Cathcart and Howden that we adjourn to 1.15 p.m..

Council Resumed at 1.15 All Members Present

Mr. Lawrence Winslow addressed the Council re the purchasing a chain saw, he told the members of Council he would be glad to demonstrate same.

The Reeve thanked Mr. Winslow for calling and explaining same.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McKnight and Councillor Cathcart that the road superintendent invite tenders for a chain saw 18 or 20 inch blade, not less than 5-horse power, and ask for demonstration of same. Carried.

Mr. G. T. Shield, county assessor; Mr. Huyck of Percy Township, also local assessor W. L. Elson paid a friendly call on the Council and set in for awhile, as also did Mr. Robert Cathcart.

Mr. A. V. Thorn collector of rates reported in the month of January taxes to amount of \$5423.92 had been collected, and recommended that the taxes on the W. 1/2 Lot 21 Con. 13 in the name of Jas. Myers be registered.

On motion of Councillors Bradburn and Howden that the Clerk be instructed to write Mr. Bradley of the V.L.A. re Jas. Myers taxes, that if same were not paid, they would be registered at the April meeting. Carried.

On motion of Councillor Cathcart and Deputy Reeve McKnight that the Collector's report be received. Carried.

On motion of Councillors Howden and Cathcart that the Clerk send an itemized account of registered taxes against Pt. Lot 13 Con. 10 Elizabeth Eggleton's property to Mr. Ivan Eggleton. Carried.

A discussion followed re the road on the 13th concession of Cavan Township.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McKnight that the Reeve and road superintendent be a committee to contact Major John Foote re an appointment with the Honourable J. N. Allen, Minister of Highways, re the road on the 13th concession of Cavan, the Deputy Reeve's name was added to this com-

mittee, and Councillor Howden seconded same. Carried.

Mr. George Allen addressed the Council, he informed them he had finished the wiring of the municipal garage, and same had been inspected. As this had not been finished until February, this would go in the road accounts for February and be brought up at the March meeting.

Mr. W. Gillis addressed the Council re an increase in pay for 1957.

On motion of Councillors Cathcart and Bradburn that the Clerk introduce certain By-Laws.

The Clerk introduced the following By-Laws:—

Money By-Law to borrow certain monies from the Toronto-Dominion Bank, and to appoint certain officers.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McKnight and Councillor Howden that we go into committee of the whole for second reading with blanks filled in as follows: That we borrow up to \$30,000.

Appointing Joe Burns as school attendance officer, at a salary of \$35.00 per year.

Valuators of animals killed, L. W. Smith, Harry Jamieson. Medical indigent officer, Dr. M. E. Hobbs.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McKnight and Councillor Bradburn committee rose and resumed.

On motion of Councillors Howden and Cathcart that By-Laws be read a third time signed, sealed and numbered 974, 975. Carried.

On motion of Councillors Cathcart and Deputy Reeve McKnight that the road superintendent order 11 ton of Calcium Chloride. Carried.

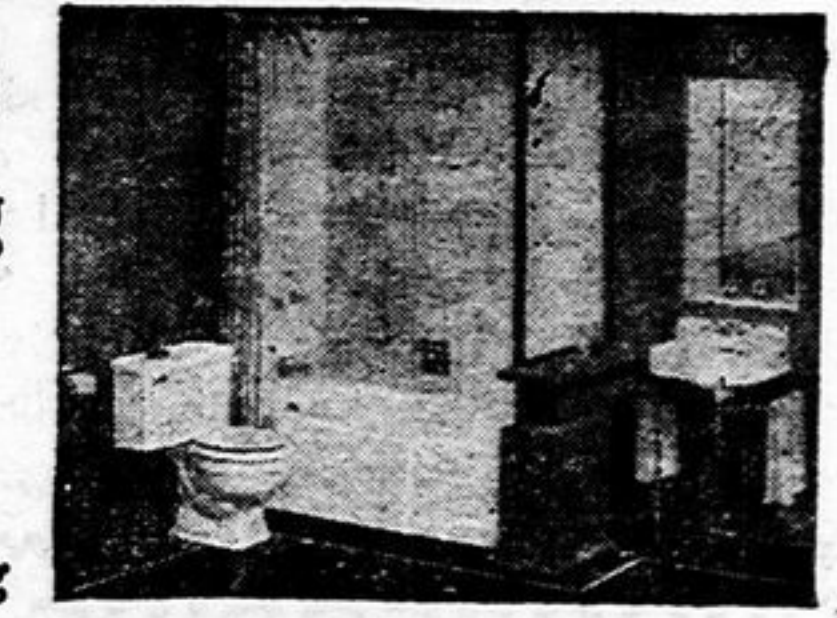

Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

In his series of talks to the children on the different parts of the church the Rev. Francis Chisholm told of the communion table. The communion table was, he said, the worship centre. It took us back to the Upper Room where Jesus first broke the bread and gave, and the communion wine to the disciples saying "Do this remembrance of me". The Bible, the centre of worship was on this table, except when the table was being used for communion. The offerings received for the extension of God's work were placed upon this table which was the symbol of our faith.

For the text of his sermon Mr. Chisholm took the six verses of Psalm 95 "O come let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord our maker". It was necessary, he said to re-discover the meaning of worship. He quoted the verse "Some go to church just for a walk, some go to church for a talk, some go to church and nod, and very few go to worship God".

There were no people no matter how primitive without some religion. Some worshipped the sun, the streams, the wind, the totem pole. Whatever the object of his worship man was inebriated and instinctively religious. For the Christian, God was fully revealed in Jesus Christ. The church is not the only place in which Christ reveals himself, but it is the house set apart for worship. Some may say "I worship God under the blue dome of heaven". The church is the place where we can gather for fellowship as a family, worship together. In small country church or the great cathedral worshippers meet a great worldwide family. We remember the promise "where two or three are gathered together (in prayer) there am I in the midst".

It is possible to come Sunday after Sunday, seeing the same faces and becoming so accustomed to the form of worship that the inward meaning is forgotten. We must re-discover the meaning of worship.

Public worship is a powerful service. The first part of the service is a preparation to the approach and mood of the attitude of worship. In the first prayer we come with awe to worship and to praise God. We ask for forgiveness for our sins, and receive the assurance "Thy sins are forgiven thee". We thank God for what he has given, the fellowship of the church and the scripture.
