

### Address By Mr. Honey

Port Hope lawyer Russell Honey, two weeks ago, told a Toronto audience that the Liberal Party in Ontario is now developing a philosophy and programme under John Wintermeyer that will go to the root of things. "A programme rooted firmly and unalterably on the principles of Liberalism which would serve as a charter for years to come."

Mr. Honey, the Liberal candidate for Durham in Federal election of last March spoke to a meeting held in support of Ronald Pickering, Provincial Liberal candidate for Toronto-Beaches.

"Our leader is not offering

the people of Ontario a short term expedient. We are not going to hold out vote-getting gimmicks and we are not going to criticize simply for the sake of criticizing. We are, in fact creating, by brick a firm foundation . . . a far sighted policy and platform . . . to offer measures and changes that will not be implemented overnight; that won't simply be adding bits and pieces to an existing welfare structure; that won't be offering just more money," Mr. Honey said.

Referring to the frequent changes in personnel of the Frost cabinet Mr. Honey told his audience that the continuous appointment and retirement of cabinet ministers gave one the impression that half of the Conservative members of the legislature are just waiting around to be discovered by Frost and the other half are afraid they will be.

**YOUR HYDRO** ELECTRICITY DOES SO MUCH . . . COSTS SO LITTLE

In criticizing the financial policy of the Frost government the speaker went back to Mr. Frost's budget address to the legislature that the Provincial debt was then \$500,000,000 on which the people of the Province were paying \$20,000,000 interest annually. Mr. Honey said that since that time under the Conservative administration the Provincial debt had doubled and we were now paying from taxes the annual interest charges totalling \$44,800,000. He charged that Ontario was now going in to debt at the rate of \$15,000 every hour of every day of the year under the Frost government.

Counselling his audience that it was the duty of all Liberals to make constructive criticism where it was warranted he said that Mr. Frost has a unique system of bookkeeping which is not used by other governments. "In the last 8 years there has not been a surplus in Ontario, although the Frost bookkeeping system suggests otherwise," he said. "As a result of its system of keeping the books the Frost government was able to show what they called a surplus last year of \$800,000. The truth is that last year the amount of money spent by the Province was \$50,000,000 more than collected," he said. "One set of books is for ordinary account and one set is for capital account. The revenue of Ontario is sufficient to pay the ordinary expenditures but not for ordinary expenditures along with capital expenditures. When the government says they had a surplus of \$800,000 last year they did not mention the set of books used for capital expenditures which, if taken into account, showed the deficit of \$50,000,000."

"We cannot expect our people to go on carrying the staggering interest payment on our provincial debt," he said. "What is needed, and no doubt what will be done by a Liberal administration is the creation of a debt retirement plan whereby the present provincial debt is frozen and paid over a period of 20 or 30 years." All future capital spending would be amortized in equal installment payments. It is time we considered a pay as you go basis of financing . . . debt is too expensive.

### THE GOOD DRIVER SAYS—

Playing Russian roulette, just to get a thrill, is a desirable social habit by comparison with bumper-chasing on expressways, just to get the driver's head to move out of the passing lane. Russian roulette is dangerous only to the show-off who plays it. But, points out the Ontario Safety League, the driver who speeds only a few feet from the car ahead could kill half a dozen people at the touch of a brake pedal, or the failure of a tire.

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
