PEACH, PEAR, PLUM and CHERRY GROWERS

A vote on a proposed Ontario Tender Fruit Growers' Marketing-for-Processing Plan for the marketing under one plan of peaches, pears, plums and cherries for processing will be held on Monday, March 16th, 1959.

Voters are reminded that their names must be on the Voters' List in order to vote.

Preliminary Voters' Lists will be posted up in the office of the Revising Officer at the office of the Agricultural Representative by February 18th, 1959.

Those seeking to have their names added to the Voters' List must appear in person before the Revising Officer on February 27th, 1959 and offer proof of eligibility to vote.

Appeals from Revising Officers' decisions will be heard by the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Board at its offices, Room 4405, East Block, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ontario on March 6th, 1959.

Copies of the proposed plan are available at the office of all Revising Officers, the office of the Agricultural Representative in each county, or at the office of the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Board.
