

South Monaghan Council Minutes

The regular meeting of the Council of the Township of South Monaghan was held in the Township Hall on February 2nd, 1959, at 8 p.m. with all members present, Reeve Geo. Dean presiding.

Minutes of the previous regular and special meetings were read by the Clerk and accepted by the Council on motion by Robert Fisher seconded by Jay Whittington.

Mr. A. J. DelPerio, a summer resident at Beebe Beach interviewed the Council in regards to the building by-law.

On motion by A. G. Anderson seconded by Herb Syer the Clerk was asked to write Mr. H. F. Wilson, and request him to move his cottage to a distance of at least fifteen feet from the side boundary, and thereby comply with the by-law.

Mr. World of the Consumer's Gas Co. interviewed the Council in regards to securing a franchise for his company to supply this Municipality exclusively. This question was discussed at some length but Council withheld a final decision at the present time, and the Clerk was asked to obtain advice from the Solicitor.

The Road Superintendent, Mr. M. H. Thompson presented voucher No. 1 in the amount of \$1,093.03 for the month of January. This was passed for payment on motion by A. G.

THE PURPOSE OF LENT

(By Rev. J. Edgar M. Palmer Rector of St. Thomas' Anglican Church, Millbrook.)

Once more the season of Lent is upon us. The origin of observance, so far as it is known, would seem to be as follows:

It takes in the whole weeks of preparation for the feast, beginning with Ash Wednesday but not including the days which are festivals. The first it lasted only forty hours the length of time our Blessed Lord lay in the grave. Then developed into the Good Friday fast and the forty days preparation for the Easter festival, the latter being a time of training the catechumens for baptism on Easter Eve. These forty days were gradually included in the fast and were kept in memory of our Lord's fast at the temptation. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and continues until the Saturday evening before Easter Sunday. Lent has become an observance of very long tradition in the Church.

People today wish to analyze a thing for itself and are not prepared to accept a teaching merely because it has tradition and authority behind it. This we are surely right, provided we will realize that the verdicts of the past are unlikely to be set aside. Our forefathers were not fools and an ancient custom such as that of observing Lent has behind it a solid weight of Christian experience which all sensible people will be ready to take into account.

If we as Christians can make the observance of an external rule an expression of an inward spiritual desire to draw near to God, then we shall find that the keeping of the rule strengthens the will and ministers to the whole life of character.

Lent is a time to take stock of ourselves and to brace up our moral muscles. We do well to turn God's searchlight upon our characters and discover whether we are growing slack in our loyalty. Lent is a time for passing behind the seen to the
