If you do not have your "Proof of Liability Insurance" Certificate, see your insurance agent today. A policy for Fire, Theft and Collision is NOT Liability Insurance. Check your Policy.

Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

Rev. Dr. Steed was again in charge, and continued his discourses on World Brotherhood with glimpses of conditions, and progress in connection with the various evangelistic undertakings, especially along the lines of the importance of medical work, as opening the door into the hearts and homes where healing of the body made a contact, that made possible also the healing of the soul.

The Scripture lesson, Luke 4:16, was read with the background of a Jewish Synagogue, with a reading desk and an illuminated cupboard where-in the scrolls from which the Scripture was read were kept, and handed out to the speaker by an appointed official. The incident used was that of Jesus reading in his home Synagogue in Nazareth, from the prophecy of Isaiah, which the congregation received with wonder and pride, which he concluded by making the statement "This day is this Scripture fulfilled in your ears", and they said "Is not this Joseph's son?" And he said unto them, verily I say unto you, no prophet is accepted in his own country," and they rose up and thrust him out of the city, and led him unto the brow of the hill, that they might cast him down headlong. But he passing through the midst of them went his way and came down to Capernaum, a city of Galilee and taught them on the Sabbath days, and they were astonished at his doctrine; for his word was with power.

Getting back to the theme of Brotherhood, Jews and Christians, and Roman Catholics are trying to do their best.

The nations of the earth have come to the point where serious efforts are being put forth to make World Brotherhood a reality. In Africa, the Gospel is being preached, and the power of Jesus is working in the bodies of the sick and also the broken hearted.
