PERSONAL MENTION.

Princess Kaiulani, of Hawaii landed at New York last week.
Hon. Edward Blake dined with Mr. Gladstone on Tuesday evening.
James Stanbury of Australia, champion sculler of the world, is en route to America.
The backer of John Graham, the Toronto skater, offers to match him against any man in the world.
At the closing meeting of the Ontario Land Surveyors Mr. Elisha Stewart of Collingwood was re-elected president.
Ex-President Harrison, accompanied by the members of his family, left Washington for Indianapolis on Saturday afternoon.
Dr. Newton has been elected reeve of Deseronto in consequence of the retirement of Messrs. Dalton and Baker from the contest.

Mr. Harwood will again be the Liberal candidate in the Vandrenil election, rendered necessary by the unseating of Mr. McMillan.
The Grand Duke Frederick of Baden, an uncle by marriage of the German Emperor, is said to be about to declare his conversion to the Church of Rome.
At Minneapolis, John S. Johnson cut the 100 and 120 yards skating record from 10 1/5 and 11 3/5 to 9 4/5 and 11 3/5 seconds respectively, standing start.
Rev. J. V. Smith, of the Metropolitan church, Toronto, has accepted the call from the Centenary church, Hamilton, subject to the approval of the Transfer Committee.

Thursday was the birthday anniversary of Pope Leo, who was born on March 2, 1810. All the Cardinals now in Rome presented him with a congratulatory address.
Rev. Dr. McMullen, of Woodstock, has been appointed a member of the Advisory Council on Religious Congresses of the World's Congress Auxiliary in connection with the World's Fair.
Speaking at a Sons of England dinner Lt.-Col. G. T. Denison said that he was satisfied the annexation agitation was fostered by paid emissaries sent in the interests of eastern capitalists.
The regular monthly cattle fair was held at Guelph last week. An average number of cattle were on the grounds. Prices ruled from 3 to 4 1/2. Quite a number were bought in for delivery on contract.

Capt. Gaskin is to be shortly entertained by the Kingston Orangemen, and it is expected that Mr. Clarke Wallace, Grand Master, will be present and will offer a justification of his political partnership with Sir John Thompson.
By the will of the late M. Doran of Kingston, his entire fortune of \$225,000 has, with the exception of \$25,000 been donated to Queen's college, the Kingston general hospital, and the Kingston Orphans' home in equal proportions.
There was a rumor in Brooklyn, N.Y., that Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage may resign the pastorate of the Tabernacle. Dr. Talmage says that in three years and four months he has received \$628 net from the church. Later the Rev. Dr. declared that he would not resign.

THE WIDE WORLD.

The net debt of the United States increased \$615,600.14 during February.
The Irish Nationalists of New York celebrated the 115th anniversary of the birth of Robert Emmet.
Grover Cleveland was formerly inaugurated as president of the United States in Washington Saturday.
An old man named Riley, living near Belmont, N.Y., was murdered Tuesday by his son, Martin Riley, aged 25.
Keepers in the Insane asylum at Austin, Texas, are said to have beaten a patient named W. H. Dulpepper to death.
A census of the immigrants in the Central Prison shows that 9 are English, 3 Irish, 3 Scotch and 30 natives of the United States.
The striking switchmen in Chicago are blamed for a number of assaults on the non-union men, and police protection has been asked.
The tone of the Russian press towards Germany has of late been very friendly, and there are signs that "Russia is beginning to think little of the French alliance."
