**BY-LAW NO. 130.**

A BY-LAW TO RAISE THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR THE PURPOSE OF BUILDING A BRIDGE ACROSS THE RIVER OTONABEE AND TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUE OF DEBENTURES OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SOUTH MONAGHAN THEREFOR.

Passed the day of 1895.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient to build a bridge across the River Otonabee to connect the Townships of South Monaghan and Otonabee and at a point opposite or near to Lot Fifteen in the Fifth Concession of the Township of South Monaghan, and for and towards the construction thereof to raise the sum of two thousand dollars by the issue of Debentures of the Corporation of the Township of South Monaghan as hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas there will be required to be raised annually by special rate for paying the debt and interest hereby created the sum of Four Hundred and Sixty Dollars, and whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Municipality according to the last revised and equalized Assessment Roll being for the year 1894 is the sum of Five Hundred and Sixty-one Thousand, Eight Hundred and Seventy dollars.

And whereas there is no existing Debenture Debt of the said Municipality.

The Corporation of the Township of South Monaghan by the council thereof and with the assent of the electors duly had as provided by law enacts as follows:

1. This by-law shall take effect on the first day of May in the year of our Lord, One Thousand, Eight Hundred and Ninety-Five.

2. There shall and may be raised and borrowed by the Corporation of the Township of South Monaghan for and towards the construction of a bridge across the River Otonabee the sum of Two Thousand dollars, and for that purpose it shall and may be lawful for the Board of the said Township to cause to be issued Debentures of the Corporation of the Township of South Monaghan for the sum of Two Thousand dollars as hereinafter mentioned.

3. Such Debentures shall be two in number and shall be for the sum of One Thousand dollars each and shall be sealed with the corporate seal of the said Corporation and signed by the Reeve and Clerk and countersigned by the Treasurer of the said Corporation. They shall be payable on the first day of May in the year Nineteen Hundred and shall bear interest at the rate of four and a half per centum per annum, half yearly, and the interest shall be paid on the first day of May and on the first day of each year and shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest upon presentation thereof, and such principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer in the Township of South Monaghan.

The money received from the sale of the said Debentures shall be paid and applied for and towards the construction of the bridge across the River Otonabee hereinafter mentioned and for no other purpose and no debenture shall be issued and no money shall be paid except upon a resolution of the said council directing the same after such arrangements shall have been made by the Treasurer and securing of the remainder of the money necessary for the construction of the said bridge as will be determined by the council be sufficient to secure the construction of such bridge.

3. There shall be raised annually and levied during the currency of the said Debentures the sum of Ninety dollars for the payment of the interest thereon and the sum of Three Hundred and Seventy dollars for the payment of the debt by a special rate in each year sufficient therefor on all the rateable property in the municipality.

The votes of the electors of the said Municipality shall be taken upon the by-law on the second day of April, 1895, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and closing at the hour of five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day at the following places and before the following Deputy Returning Officers in and for the respective wards of the said Township:

In Ward Number One at the Lucas Hall, in the Village of Bellefleur, Alfred Dawson to be Deputy Returning Officer.

In Ward Number Two at the Agricultural Hall, in the Village of Centreville, Robert Lang to be Deputy Returning Officer.

7. The third day of April, 1895, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon and the place where the Clerk of the said council shall sum up the number of persons to attend at the various polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk respectively on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of the by-law respectively.
