Mrs. George Freelove Dies As Result Of Auto Accident

One person was fatally injured and five others hurt, one seriously, about 11.10 p.m. Wednesday in a head-on collision on Highway 115, about 4 miles north-west of Millbrook at what is known as the quarter line.

Mrs. George Freelove, of Millbrook, died on Thursday in St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough. In hospital in serious condition with chest and throat injuries is Glen Wannamaker, age 48, of Lakefield.

Four other Lakefield residents required outpatient treatment. Treated by Dr. Russell Magee were Harold Trude, for a lacerated chin and forehead; Galvin Dunford, laceration on the left knee; Gordon Scriver, lacerated hands and left knee, and Robert Dunford, lacerated forehead and left wrist.

Harry Freelove of Millbrook, and Roy Kidd of Lakefield, were taken to hospital but did not require treatment.

H. Freelove, driver of a 1950 model car was travelling west on highway 115, and was starting to make a left hand turn off of the highway onto the quarter line, when he met the other car driven by Robert Dunford of Lakefield, travelling toward Peterborough, Ont. on the highway. Harry was taking the longer way home due to the poor condition of the Cavan road, the natural turn for Millbrook when coming from Peterborough.

After the collision the Dunford car rolled over, ending on the soft shoulder about 150 feet from the Freelove car. Mrs. Freelove a front seat passenger was thrown through the windshield. She was the only passenger in the Freelove car.

In the Dunford car were Gordon Scriver, Glen Wannamaker, Galvin Dunford, Roy Kidd, and Harold Trude, all of Lakefield. They were returning from a hockey game in Bowmanville.

The two cars were totally wrecked by the impact. Glass

was scattered over the highway for about 200 feet, and parts of the cars were strewn along the soft shoulder.

First on the scene was Marshal Fallis who lives nearby. He heard the crash, and phoned the police.

The injured were taken to hospital by Nesbitt ambulance.

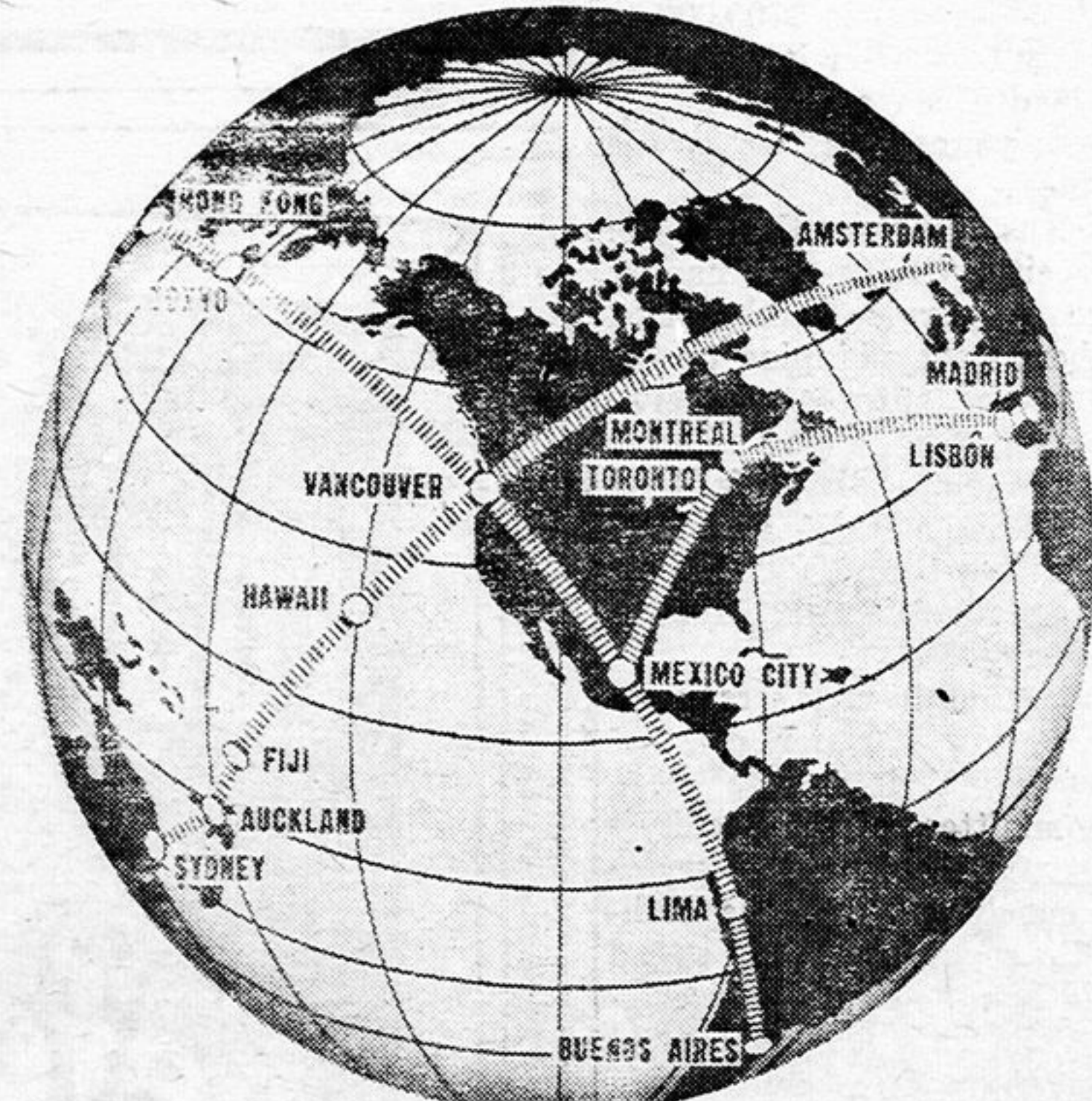
