SYMPOSIUM

Approximately eighty people attended the meeting of the Federation of Agriculture and the Farmers Union in Blackstock on March 7th. Mr. Clarence Allin, president of the Durham County Federaton was in the chair.

Also on the platform were members of the Smpyosium, Mr. Ed. Summers, Agricultural Representative of Durham; Mr. Mansell Stacey, agricultural science teacher at Bowmanville High School; Mr. Elmer Scott, chairman of the Durham County Medical Co-op. Services; and Mr. Garnet Shield, chief assessor of the United Counties.

In a humorous address Mr. Summers pointed out the trend to more costly mechanization and to larger more specialized farming. Farmers in beef cattle should grow a cash crop. Despite lower farm income, some farm enterprises compare favourably with other industries.

Mr. Stacey said only 3% of those graduating from High School attended Agricultural Colleges. Student is given an appreciative and understanding not only of other methods but other phases of agriculture of which he or she is not familiar.

Mr. Scott explained the government plan dealt solely with hospitalization. Medical services in societies were needed to take care of surgical requirements.

Mr. Shield stated that assessment in the United Counties amounted to approximately 66 millions of dollars. The question of land free education tax favoring the farmer had been suggested by the Federation some years ago but was not practical in view of the counter demands that would be made by other industries.

 TO FLUE-CURED TOBACCO GROWERS

A vote on a petition received from a Provisional Committee of Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco Growers that a proposed flue-cured tobacco grower's marketing plan be approved will be held on Monday, April 1st, 1957. Polling booths will be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the following places in the following counties:

An official voters' list will be posted in each polling booth. If you are listed as an eligible grower you are entitled and urged to vote. Only one vote per flue-cured tobacco farm may be cast regardless of the number of joint owners there may be and only one vote per flue-cured tobacco farm owner may be cast regardless of the number of such farms he may own. Company owned farms have one vote.
