

Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

For his talk to the children the Rev. Francis Chisholm told of a recent visit to the Ontario legislature in Toronto. The session was opened by prayer led by the speaker of the house. In the visitors' gallery he noticed a group of public school children, who had come to see how parliament was conducted. They heard Premier Leslie Frost speak on the health scheme; they also heard the lieutenant governor of Ontario speak. Among the matters discussed was the bringing out of the "Sunday Telegram". Mr. Chisholm said boys and girls too should consider what they should and should not do on the Sabbath. The Lord's Day Act tried to see that it was a day of rest for all with certain exemptions for work of necessity. Just as a car battery needs to be re-charged, so people need a day off to be re-charged bodily and in their minds and souls. Sunday should not be a dismal day, but a happy one in which to enjoy friendship and God's good gifts. Let us remember the Sabbath as a happy day, a home day, a holiday and a holy day.

took the subject "Jesus the good shepherd", with the text found in the Gospel according to St. John, chapter 10 verses 11 and 14 "I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. I am the good shepherd and know my sheep, and am known of mine."

In the holy land in Jesus' lifetime, the picture of the sheep with the little lambs gamboling on the hillside was a common one. There was always a shepherd with them, leading his flock, sometimes carrying a lamb in his arms, protecting them always from danger. He not only protected them from wild animals, but he led them to pasture, so they were dependent on him for sustenance as well as for safety. The shepherd knew his flock by name and between him and his sheep was a beautiful understanding. The shepherd must be kind, noble, courageous true, to protect and to guide his sheep. Perhaps as Jesus called himself the good shepherd of his people a real shepherd with his flock could be seen on the hillside above them.

There's a legend about Moses that once while he was keeping Jethro's sheep, one wandered away. Moses followed and found it drinking at a mountain stream. He said "It was because you were thirsty you wandered away" and he picked it up in his arms and carried it home. God thought that since Moses was so compassionate to a stray sheep he was the man to lead His people. They needed a shepherd to lead them to the promised land.

Jesus was compassionate to the multitude, weighed down by care and sorrow. He was moved to the depths of his heart because he saw them as sheep without a shepherd, uncared for and unshepherded. They haunted him, and his pity was the driving force which led the good shepherd to give his life for them. Were it not for Jesus we too would be lost, fearful, unsatisfied. Like sheep without a shepherd we could not find our way. We should be like lost children in the rain. Life at times is so bewildering we stand at the crossroads not knowing which way to take. Only by following Jesus can we find the right way. Without the good shepherd we cannot find the pasture for sustenance. We need inspiration which we cannot find elsewhere. St. Augustine said "Thou made us for Thyself, and our hearts are restless until we find rest in Thee".

Without the shepherd the sheep have no defence against the robber or wild beast. We cannot live our life alone. No one can keep us from the

cannot give him rest. Take Him as your shepherd. He is the only one who can give you guidance, who can nourish and keep you from temptation. "All we like sheep have gone astray". The Good Shepherd offers to give his own life for us. "I am the Good Shepherd; the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep". Commit your life to Him and to His all saving power.

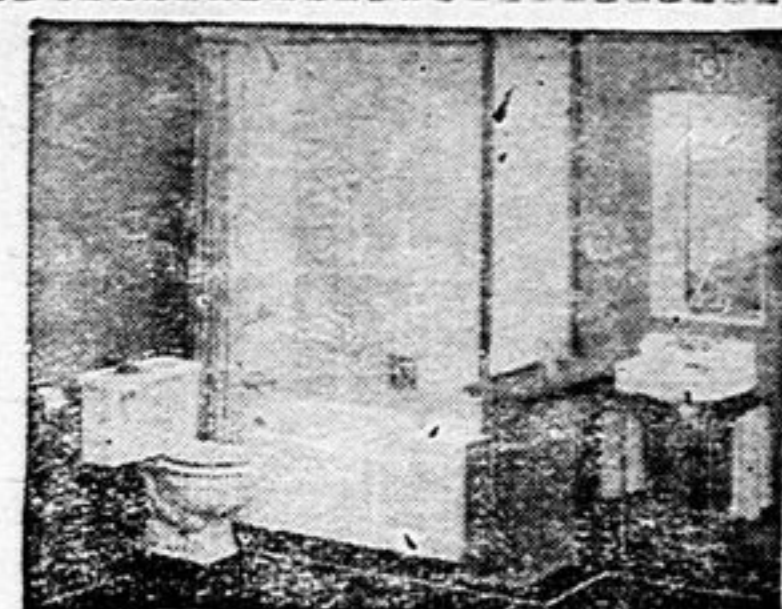

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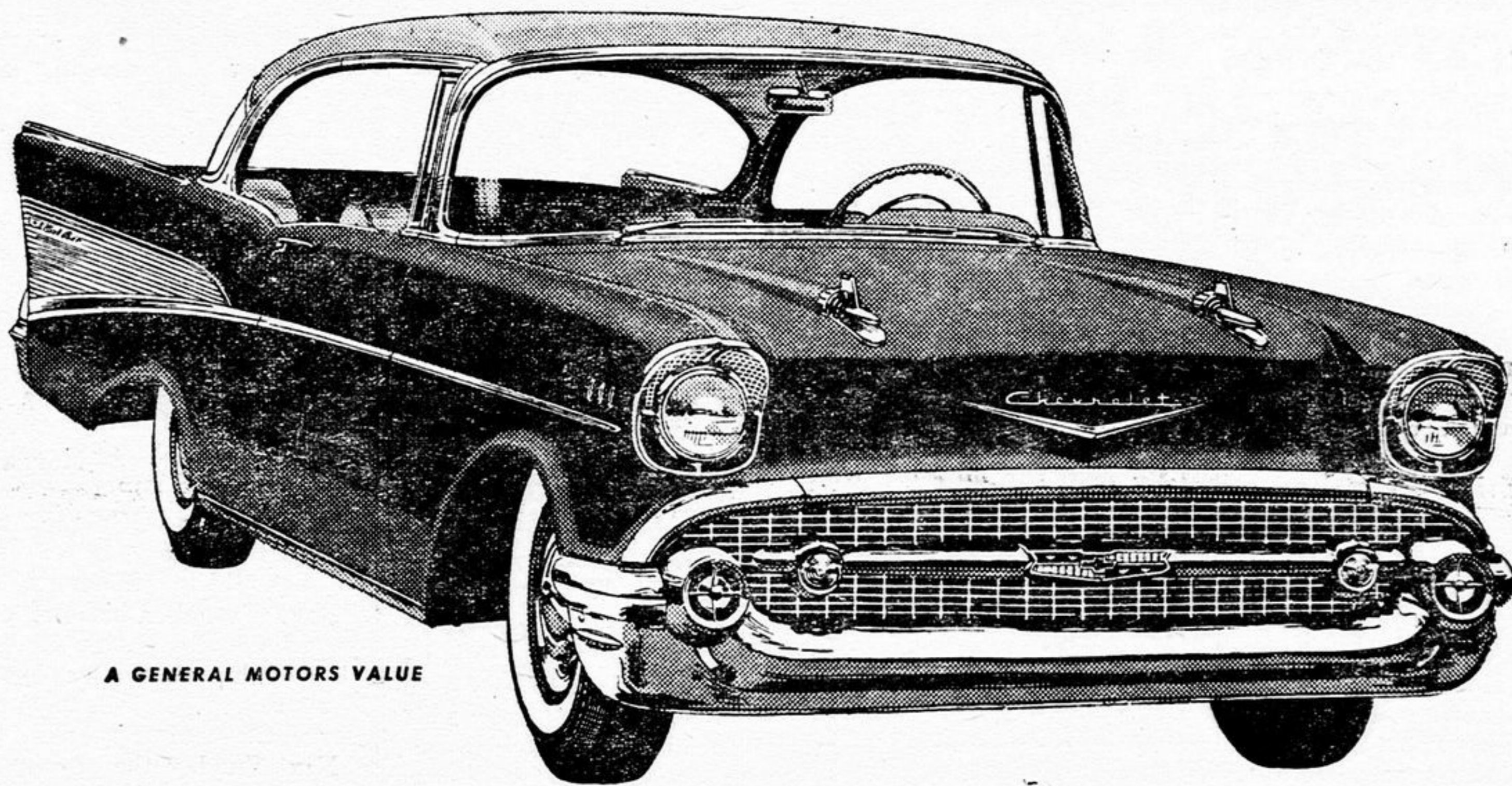
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
