Obituary

Edwin J. Armstrong.

After an illness of three months duration, Edward J. Armstrong of R.R. No. 3, passed away in Peterborough Civic Hospital on Sunday, February 23rd, in his 67th year.

The late Mr. Armstrong was born and educated in Cavan Township and was a son of Robert John Armstrong and his wife Martha Mahaffey, both deceased, and spent most of his life farming in Cavan.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, the former Evelyn L. Fallis; two sons, Murray and Edwin at home; and one daughter Mrs. Bert Gardiner (Aunt) of Cavan Township; and one grandchild Linda Gardiner; two brothers, Ernest L. Armstrong, Cavan Township, and Bert Armstrong of Peterborough; also two sisters, Christina and Eva Armstrong, both of Cobourg, Ontario.

Mr. Armstrong was a regular attendant of St. Andrew's United Church where he served on the Board of Stewards.

The funeral, under the direction of the J. W. Haw Funeral Home, was held on Wednesday afternoon, February 26th, at 2 o'clock from St. Andrew's Church with the Pastor Rev. Francis P. Chisholm, assisted by a former Pastor Rev. A. L. Sisco, of Warkworth, conducting the services. Interment was in Gardiner's Cemetery, Cavan Township with the following acting pallbearers: Eric Fallis, Fred Lewers, Merton Tixton, Charles Stapleton, James Ferguson and Jack Armstrong.

W. Frederick Fallis.

A well-known and highly respected resident of Cavan Township, Wilbur Frederick Fallis, passed away at his home on the sixth concession of Cavan on Wednesday, February 26, in his 81st year, after an illness of short duration.

He leaves to cherish his memory two sons, Arnold of Millbrook, and Marshall on the farm; and one daughter, Mrs. Alex. Auld (Florence) of Oshawa. Eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive. His wife the former Ethel Ball, predeceased him many years ago.

Mr. Fallis was widely known through the Peterborough Presbytery and Bay of Quinte Conference for his work on behalf of Sunday School and Temperance Education. For many years he served as lay representative to Peterborough Presbytery and lay delegate to Bay of Quinte Conference.

He had been Sunday School Superintendent at St. Andrew's for twenty-five years. From

1925 to the time of his death he served as an elder in the local church.

Since 1904 he had been a member of Millbrook IOOF Lodge No. 308 and had received his 50-year jewel. The Odd-fellows held a service at the Haw Funeral Home on Friday evening.

St. Andrew's Church was crowded to the doors for his funeral service on Saturday, which was conducted by the Rev. Francis P. Chisholm, the Pastor, assisted by Dr. Harold Neale chaplain of the Millbrook Reformatory.

The pallbearers were six of his nephews: Kenneth Fallis of Toronto, Eric Fallis, Millbrook, Russell Fallis, Rochester, N.Y., Lloyd Fallis, Ballyduff, Clifford Fallis, Pontypool, and Clarence Ball, Millbrook.

Forming a guard of honour at the casket were members of Session: Herbert Patton and Bruce Ingham, and Wilfred Elson and J. T. Crowley.

Interment was in Gardiner's Cemetery, Cavan Township.

The ability to do these things is desirable; the performance of them, except possibly in an emergency, is criminal.

The mature driver shows his skill in quiet, inconspicuous efficiency. In smooth, unhurried operating; exact road-positioning at all times; helpfulness to other road users, and mis-users; complete control in every existing, or potential situation.

Maturity is mainly a state of mind. The mature driver can be of any age, from 16 up.

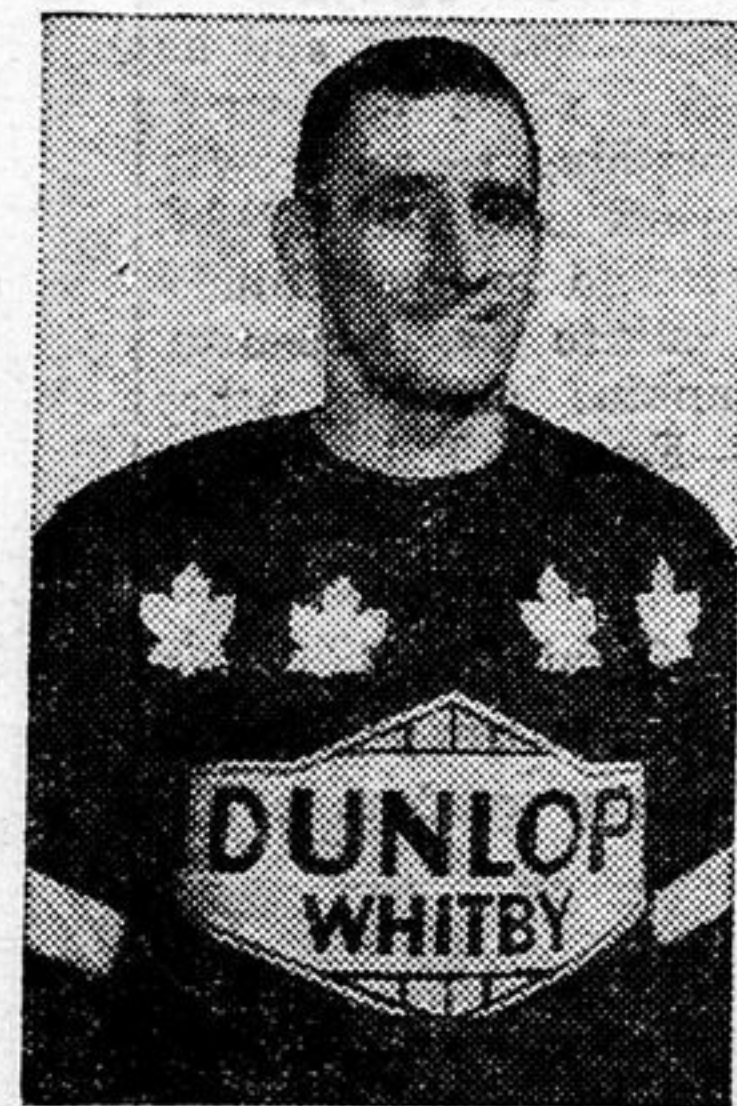
