

## Durham Co'y Liberal Association

Mr. Arthur J. Brown, speaking to a Liberal gathering in Bowmanville last month, advised the meeting that the people of Ontario should be able to expect leadership from the Department of Education. He was particularly critical of a system which did not provide equality of educational opportunities. Mr. Brown referred to the fact that there are 1200 persons now teaching in Ontario on permits from the Department of Education. Permits are issued to those who lack the minimum standard requirements of the Department of Education. He said that in Ontario there is no Doctor or lawyer practising who does not meet the requirements of their particular profession and that, our children being our greatest asset, it was unfortunate that the Department of Education permitted unqualified persons to teach them in their formative years. Mr. Brown is now serving his sixth term as school trustee for Ward 9 in the city of Toronto and in 1953 was Chairman of the Toronto Board of Education. "Dr. Dunlop is living 50 years in the past," he said. "It is not sufficient to have a baby sitter in every classroom, the people of Ontario are entitled to have qualified teachers in every classroom." The speaker said that educational opportunities were not equal in the Province as people in larger centres would not permit teaching on permit whereas rural areas were being forced to hire such teachers in order to obtain someone to fill the position in the rural schools.

The speaker, who was a candidate for the mayoralty in the City of Toronto in 1953, attacked the Frost government for a system which would allow, as is the case in Ontario, 85 administrative Boards and Tribunals to be set up. This situation became so bad that the Premier has now set up the Gordon commission to investigate the commissions. He said that the elected representatives should be responsible to the people and it was not sufficient for them to shrug off criticism of their responsibilities by saying that a particular board or commission was responsible for the decision. He also said that there should be a right of ap-

peal from the decisions of these boards and tribunals, he had particular reference to the Ontario Municipal Board and the Ontario Liquor Board.

The election of officers was carried out for the Liberal Association of the Town of Bowmanville and the youth in the Liberal party was evidenced in the election to the presidency of Glen Fry, 26 year old Bowmanville resident, 1st Vice-president Mayor Wilfred Caruthers; 2nd Vice-president, lawyer Lawrence Mason, 3rd Vice-president Dr. Howard Rundle; Secretary-treas., Mrs. Robert Kent was re-elected to that position.

E. R. "Ted" Woodyard, Liberal candidate for Durham in the next Provincial election addressed the meeting. Mr. Woodyard paid tribute to the Ontario leader John Wintermeyer as being a highly educated man who had great qualifications to serve as the Premier of the Province of Ontario. He mentioned that he was a family man who was deeply attached to his wife and five children, a man who believed in the cause of Liberalism and who was prepared to devote all of his time and efforts to the attainment of better government in Ontario.

### THE TORONTO-DOMINION BANK INSTALLS T.V. SYSTEM IN BANK

Closed circuit television made its debut in Canadian banking in Toronto on 25th of February. On this day a closed circuit industrial T.V. system went into regular operation in the Current Accounts Department at the King and Bay Streets office of the Toronto-Dominion Bank in Toronto. It is the first installation of its kind in a Canadian bank.

This latest electronic innovation will enable a teller on the main banking floor to view on a television monitor a ledger sheet which is kept in the Bookkeeping Department in a remote corner of the building on another floor. When the customer presents a cheque drawn on a certain account, the teller simply calls the Bookkeeping Department on a two-way communications system and requests that the ledger sheet for this account be put on the screen. The same procedure can be followed to validate the signature on a cheque. The girl in the Bookkeeping Department then places the ledger in front of the camera and it is shown on the teller's monitor. Monitors are also located in the office of the manager and assistant managers of the branch, so that they can immediately review the status of any account by calling through to the Bookkeeping Department.

Although in this case installation is completely located under one roof, in practice the Bookkeeping Department could be situated in another building several miles from the branch. According to John Laing, the Toronto-Dominion's Methods Superintendent, the day is not far off when this system, known as "centralized posting" will be in widespread use with Canadian banks. This means that one Bookkeeping Department, centrally located, will maintain the ledgers for a group of branches in the same general area.

Although the closed circuit television installation is a new trend in Canadian banking, Mr. Laing stated that certain banks in the United States and Europe have been using the device for some time.

"In these cases the application is somewhat different," he said. "The camera is at the teller's

position and the teller screens the cheque for the bookkeeper at the other end. After looking at the ledger, the bookkeeper then authorizes the cheque."

Mr. Laing added that he could not predict whether this latter procedure would become a part of the Toronto-Dominion's operations. "This is strictly a pilot system that we have here," he said, "and while we believe it to be a major step forward, we intend to study it thoroughly before going ahead with bigger and more complicated installations throughout the bank."

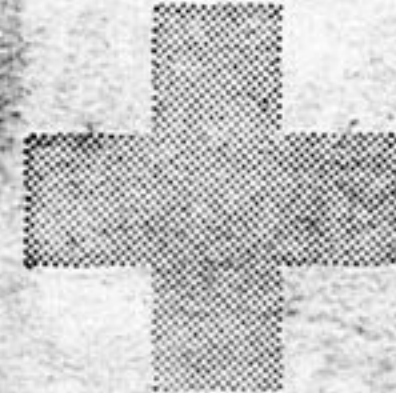
