Sealed Tenders, addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "TENDER FOR DREDGING, PORT HOPE, ONTARIO," will be received in the office of the Secretary until 3 p.m. (EST) WEDNESDAY, MARCH 18th, 1959.

Combined specifications and form of tender can be seen and obtained at the office of the Chief Engineer (H. & R.), Ottawa, Ontario, also at the office of the District Engineer, 385 Yonge Street, Toronto, Ontario.

To be considered each tender must be accompanied by one of the alternative securities called for in the tender documents. Tenders must be made on the printed forms supplied by the Department and in accordance with the conditions set forth therein.

Tenders must include the towing of the plant to and from the work.

The dredges and other floating plant which are intended to be employed on this work, to be eligible, must—

- (a) be of Canadian or United Kingdom registry, and
- (b) be of Canadian or United Kingdom make or manufacture and, in the case of U.K. equipment, have been in Canada at least one year prior to the date of the tender call.
