AN APPRECIATION EDITH AMELIA SHEPPARD

Coming to Canada from England in 1904, Edith Sheppard became a member of the household of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Needham, and has continued as a capable and faithful companion and helper for Miss May Needham till her illness on September 23rd, 1958, required hospital care in Civic Hospital, Peterborough, where her death occurred on Monday, March 2nd, 1959.

Miss Sheppard, in her earlier years was a regular attendant at St. Andrew's choir for many years, belonged to the Golden Links Mission Circle, and was a member of St. Andrew's United Church.

Her funeral service, Thursday, March 5th, from the home of Miss Needham, was largely attended, with Rev. J. Arthur Steed, Peterborough, minister pro-tem, of St. Andrew's Church, assisted by the Rev. J. Edgar Palfrey of St. Thomas' Anglican Church, conducting. Burial was in the Needham family plot in Gardiner's Cemetery. Active pallbearers were: Ernest Powell, Gordon Might, Donald Spicer, Lloyd Byam, David R. Fowler and Robert Larmer, with Messrs. W. H. Coombe of Millbrook, and T. H. Stinson, Q.C., of Lindsay, as honorary bearers.

Six Applicants For Clerk's Job

Millbrook, March 2, 1959.—The regular monthly meeting of the Municipal Council of the Village of Millbrook was held on the above date with all members of the Council present, Reeve G. F. Harrington presiding.

The minutes of the last regular meeting of February 2nd, also special meeting of February 19th, were read and approved.

The following communications were read by the Clerk:

From—The Consumers' Gas Co. re industrial development department. The department of planning and development, industrial development, Ontario Chamber of Commerce, survey, Northumberland and Durham Health Unit reporting for the month January. Northumberland and Durham Firemen's Association, membership fees. Department of Highways, Port Hope, enclosing rates chargeable for machine rental. Lake Ontario Telephone Authority, announcing that an increase of 25% had been granted in Telephone rentals, to Durham Telephones Limited.

Motion by Councillors Crough and Gibson that communications not otherwise dealt with be received and filed.

Motion by Councillors Gibson and Ridge that Northumberland and Durham Firemen's Association Membership Fee for the year 1959 be paid in the amount of \$10.00. Carried.

Motion by Councillors Crough and Gibson that the Millbrook Fire Department be given a grant, same as last year, to meet expenses in promoting mutual aid within the area. Amount \$45.00. Carried.

Motion by Councillors Thornton and Ridge that one-half of the membership fees for this year 1959, in the Association of Assessing Officers of Ontario, in conjunction with the Township of Cavan, be assumed by Municipality of Millbrook. Amount \$5.00. Carried.

Motion by Councillors Ridge and Thornton that the Clerk be authorized to order 110, 100 lb. bags of Calcium Chloride from Allied Chemicals Canada Ltd. Same to be picked up at point of delivery Amhurstburg, Ontario, by Buckham's Transport. Carried.

Motion by Councillors Thornton and Crough that the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to complete a By-law to provide for the 1959 expenditures on roads or streets in the Village. The estimated expenditure to be \$4,000.00. Carried. By-law No. 858.
