EIGHTY-ONE REPORTERS FOR DURHAM FARM ACCIDENT SURVEY

Eighty-one farm folk have consented to assist with the Ontario Farm Accident Survey in Durham County starting March 1st, 1959 and going through to February 29, 1960. Representatives of practically all farm groups in the county will be reporting including Womens Institutes, Jr. Farmers, Commodity Groups, and Senior Farm Organizations.

The purpose of the survey is to focus attention on the alarming number of farm accidents in which farm people are not only killed, but in many cases maimed for life or have loss of income or property due to the accident which we are told could often have been prevented. In addition it is hoped that information will be obtained in more detail on the cause of accidents and where and when they actually do happen. From this information it will be possible to carry out a more informal programme of rural safety education.

The co-operation of everyone is asked in providing statistics on any accident in which farm people are involved. The reporters are doing this work as a voluntary contribution and if you are involved in an accident, you can be of help to them by giving them the facts. Incidentally no ones name is given and the reports are given only on a township and county basis, so that you can readily see they are confidential. A reportable accident is one in which anyone involved in the accident loses at least 2 hours working time or has property damage, medical expense, etc. totalling \$25.00 or more. All accidents happening to farm people such as accidents in the home, on the farm, in the farm buildings, or on the highway, and fires are to be reported.

Questions that you will be asked will include the time of the accident the place of the accident or fire, cause of the accident, such as faulty equipment, speed, etc. the age and sex of the operator involved, the time lost by all victims except fatalities, medical bills incurred including hospitalization, and property damage. As we have intimated this information is confidential so only the reporter will know who the actual report is from.

These sheets will be sent to the Ontario Department of Agriculture in Bowmanville and from there will be sent on to Toronto for analysis. Resulting information will be available to anyone who is desirous of making use of it in farm accident prevention work.

We cannot over stress the importance of this survey, and a few facts from other surveys point out the importance of doing something about preventing farm accidents. Did you know that it is three times safer to work in a factory than on a farm. Did you know that in a survey in Bruce County in 1957 it actually cost the 4,000 farmers in that county over \$50.00 per farm in property loss, and medical expenses as a result of farm accidents. Did you know that in one survey it was reported that 1 out of 3 of the children born today will be killed or injured in a highway accident during their lifetime. And finally do you realize in Canada is one of the worst countries in the world, for fires. We believe you will agree that these facts point out the need for the survey and we are looking for your co-operation.
