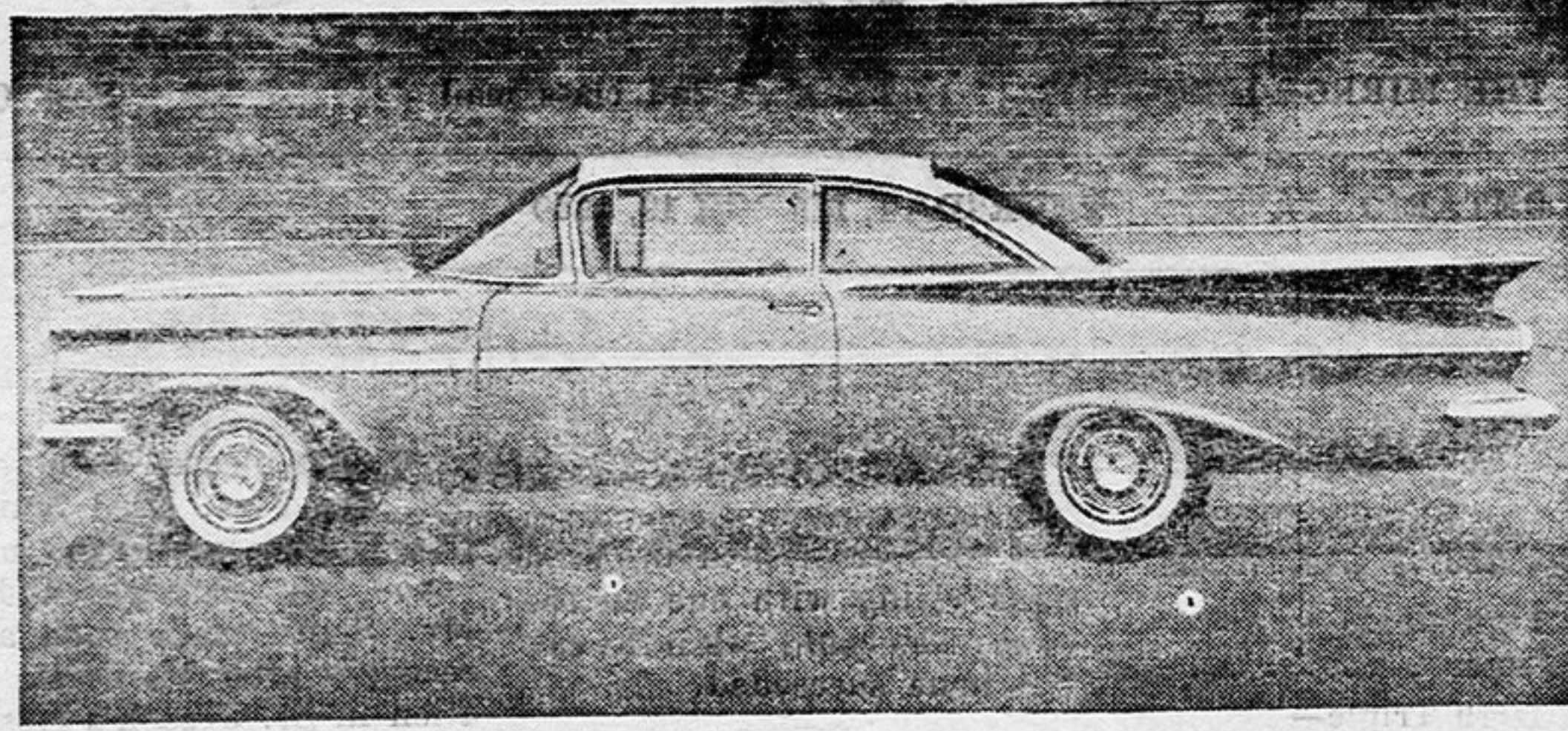


GORDON TRICK ELECTED CONVENTION DELEGATE IN TORONTO APRIL 3rd

A large representative gathering of Liberals of Durham County attended a meeting of the Executive of the Durham County Liberal Association held at the Oddfellows Hall in Ortono on Monday evening, March 9th, 1959. President Elmore Scott of Hope Township was Chairman of the meeting.

Delegates elected to the Annual Meeting of the Ontario Liberal Association in Toronto on April 3rd, 1959 were:

-elected were: William Bragg, Darlington Elmore Scott, Hope Harry Wade, Clarke Thomas White, Pontypool Frank Rickard, Newcastle Neil Malcolm, Cartwright.

The meeting decided to launch a drive for membership in the Association with the hope that all persons who are interested in a Liberal Government in Ontario will affiliate themselves with the Association. Membership cards will be available in the near future from all members of the executive and will be sold for \$1.00 each. Proceeds from the sale of membership cards will be used to finance the forthcoming Provincial campaign.

Speaker of the meeting was T. R. "Ted" Woodyard who advised his audience that there was a trend in favour of Liberals in Ontario. He urged that advantage be taken of the trend explaining that there was great dissatisfaction in Ontario with the Frost Government. He said that Liberals must win converts by showing that they are prepared to give better

government than the present government in power for 17 years. He illustrated his remarks with reference to the dissatisfaction with the Frost government by saying that every time Mr. Frost dismisses a cabinet minister it is like a surgeon operating for a malignant growth—"We hope that he got it all but we can never be sure".

Mr. Woodyard said that we have a changing economy in Durham County. Thirty years ago Durham was primarily an agricultural economy. Today the economy is balanced between agriculture, labour and small business. The Liberal Candidate said that he felt it his duty to give representation to all three groups on equal basis and he said that the economy of Durham, like the economy of Ontario, must func-

tion as a unit and that we must administer equally for all groups within the economy and not to one group to the detriment of another. He said that it was a mistake for labour to think that the CCF was the only

political party that could represent them and stated that he was prepared to "go to bat" for labour and was equally prepared to assist the other two groups in the economy.

The next meeting of the Durham County Liberal Association which is now preparing its fight for the forthcoming campaign in support of Mr. Woodyard was set for Newcastle on March 23rd, 1959.
