

Newcastle Loses an Old Resident.

Newcastle, Ont., April 4 .- One of our most respected and esteemed residents, Mr. Frederick Farucomb, is dead. Mr. Farncomb was born in London, Eng., 67 years ago. He came to Canada at the age of 24 and settled in Newcastle, where he has since resided. He was postmaster of this place for five yoars and was collector of customs for 25 years. By death the Church of England here has sustained a loss which is almost irreparable, as he was one of her most prominent members, having served as warden for over 25 years. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn his death. His family consists of one daughter and five sons. Three of the sons are ministers and the other two are doctors.

A circular recently issued by the Port Hope Harbor Board, gives an idea how that town secures business for their larbor. After drawing attention of shippers to the facilities afforded at that place for storing and shipping, the commissioners state that they will "unload lumber from open cars, and attend to the shipping of the same, for 16 cents per thousand, including toils."
