# THE MANITOBA SCHOOL QUES- TION.

This all absorbing subject, that has  
taken so deep a hold upon the thoughts  
and conversations of our people within  
the last month, the far-reaching im-  
portance and results of which are des-  
tined to live and effect not only us,  
but our children to many generations,  
may well have all the consideration  
and discussion that calm reflection and  
enlightened argument can bring to  
bear. The Toronto News of Monday  
last, appreciating the gravity of the  
situation as expressed by eminent  
representative men, gave an interview  
with the majority of the clergymen of  
that city and the undoubted impar-  
tiality of those men of thought and pub-  
licity should be taken as an index of the  
feeling in their respective congregations  
and constituencies. Summed up in  
one brief sentence the conclusions  
arrived at by the vast majority are  
these, "That while it is desirable to  
have religious instructions in our  
schools, while we cannot better ad-  
vance the general knowledge of the  
pupils than by supplementing the  
lessons with instruction from the  
"Book of Books," if, in our mixed and  
skeptical class of citizens the imparting  
of mode of imparting, or the version  
used, is to be a cause of strife and dis-  
cord, better banish entirely all religious  
teaching, so called, from the program.  
Many of the reverend gentlemen go  
farther and question the advisability  
and benefit of having the Divine word  
handled lightly and irreverently as it  
is in schools of modern times. These views  
entirely express those offered by us  
in our notice of the situation two weeks  
ago, and to our mind lay down the  
easy and only course to be pursued in  
the matter. On the question of  
Dominion interference there is scarce-  
ly a dissenting voice, but all in one  
accord, say "hands off," and this again  
seems the wisest plan from every point  
of view, leaving it to those who are  
directly interested and who may be  
permitted to know what is best cal-  
culated to advance the interests of  
Manitoba, educationally and socially,  
and whose sense of justice to all classes  
and whose sense of the acknowledged,  
and creeds may be required nothing  
further than a mere mention of the  
fact that minorities have rights that  
should not only be admitted, but so  
far as the general and national well  
being is concerned, should be respected,  
and that in this respect, the equally  
question is often forgotten, which  
majorities have also rights, and more  
than those of the smaller body. It  
is beyond doubtless the case in too  
many instances, that the majority are  
led away by factious and selfish  
representations, and inflict wrong-  
doings upon their weaker neighbors.

it may even be that open revolt against  
the tyranny and oppression of a  
majority is excusable and proper in  
some cases. But so long as we have  
government by popular majority, so  
long, in our country, at least, as the  
high standard of representatives is kept  
up, may we expect any momentary  
hardship to right itself by the local  
members without the interference of  
outside agencies. The report of the  
Inspector of schools for Manitoba just  
to hand goes to show that the new law  
is operating most satisfactory and al-  
though looked at with askance by the  
Roman Catholic laity at the time, is  
being accepted to a great extent in  
that virgin country where the inhabi-  
tants are progressive in the highest  
sense. The report says, "I find that  
even when the Catholics have full  
control of the districts they generally  
put in one English trustee." Again  
the report further states, "The con-  
stant agitation, which has been kept  
up during the past year, has certainly  
had the effect of creating and interest  
in regard to educational matters, and  
I am satisfied that when the school  
question is finally settled this increased  
interest will have a very beneficial  
effect on the French schools of the  
Province. I have no hesitation in say-  
ing that the vast majority of them  
were prepared to give up the final  
decision of the authorities, and it will  
only be a matter of a short time before  
the public school system will be uni-  
versally adopted throughout the Pro-  
vince." There is no gaining saying  
the fact that were the rank and file of  
the Catholics of Manitoba left to their  
free choice, the new conditions which  
make not only for the better develop-  
ment of their children, but the greatest ad-  
vancement of the Province would soon  
be deeply ingrafted into a harmonious  
and contented people. While it is  
our bounded duty as individuals to  
respect the convictions and creeds of  
every citizen of our country, to main-  
tain if necessary by our utmost effort  
peace and harmony within the confines  
of our Dominion, to go farther than  
that and require the state to legislate  
special privileges into the hands of one  
religious body, is making the civil  
government a special pleader for that  
body, which has been disestablished  
long ago, so far as legislative authority  
goes, in every progressive country, ex-  
cept one, and there the wheels are in  
motion.

# THE VILLAGE COUNCIL.

The council met on Monday evening last  
in regular session. All the members pre-  
sent, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of  
previous meeting read and approved.

The matter of a quantity of new hose re-  
quired by the Fire company was discussed  
and a motion by Councillor Bateson, secon-  
ded by Councillor Clarke, instructing the  
clerk to procure 100 feet of the Baker-Fabric  
Hose was carried.

The dog tax by-law (of Councillor Bateson  
and seconded by Councillor Clarke) was  
discussed and it was decided to refer the  
matter to the next meeting. It was also  
decided to have a by-law of this nature  
framed so as to establish a better system of  
collecting dog taxes and be thought at the  
expiration of one year and a committee  
not only to be a financial benefit, to the  
village but would prove satisfactory to the  
majority of the ratepayers and would  
have a tendency to set aside the bone of  
contention held by those who are not the  
fortunate (or unfortunate) owners of dogs.  
Councillor Campbell said he could not see  
where the tag system would be an improve-  
ment on the old way of collecting the dog  
tax. He also said that any changes were  
made there should be a tax of ten dollars  
imposed on bitches.

Councillor Clark thought that every man  
should be allowed to buy his own tag.  
The Reeve stated that he had consulted  
the town solicitor on the matter and was  
of the opinion that the tag system was  
and was certainly of the opinion that there  
should be some better plan for the col-  
lection of dog taxes than that of the dogs  
becoming a nuisance.

Moved by Councillor Bateson, seconded  
by Councillor Richardson, that the council  
go to the committee of the whole on the  
reading of by-law to regulate dogs running  
at large. Carried.

The by-law was read a second time and  
finally passed at the last stage.  
Council resumed general business, when  
the clerk was called upon for report on ten-  
ders for printing as at previous meet-  
ing. The Clerk then read a tender from  
a Peterboro office. The Reeve made  
verbal application for the tender and  
offered to do the work at the same rates as heretofore.

The Reeve drew the attention of the  
council to the fact that the tender from the  
outside office was somewhat lower than the  
amount paid to the home office but that  
he would advise them to consider the mat-  
ter before deciding to send the order  
outside of the corporation as there was a  
certain amount of advertising that was com-  
monly to have done inside the corporation  
no matter by whom the contract for the  
general printing was held.

Councillor Bateson thought the printing  
of the municipality should be done for \$60  
and that the home office should be in a position  
to compete with the present arrangement  
and in support of his argument moved that  
a committee be appointed, composed of the  
Reeve and Councillor Richardson to consult  
with the publisher and see if an arrange-  
ment of that kind could be entered into.  
The motion was carried.

Mr. High Johnson appeared before the  
council and complained of overcharge of  
taxes for 1894. The Reeve looked carefully  
into the matter and said it would be dealt  
with at the next meeting.

The Treasurer, Mr. W. T. Wood, explained  
to the council that the finances were get-  
ting low and that with present demands it  
would be necessary to make provision for more  
funds. He also explained that certain docu-  
ments in regard to taxable property should  
be in by April 26th for registration.

Accounts from Messrs. Jewison and Har-  
per for drawing fire engine were ordered  
to be paid.

A document from the town solicitor was  
presented, but as the clerk was unable to  
point the proper notes the Reeve was ap-  
pointed a deputation to wait on the Soli-  
citor and if possible secure the combination  
whereby the council could get at the con-  
tents.
