The regular monthly meeting of South Monaghan Council was held in the Township Hall on April 1st, at 1 p.m. with all members present and Reeve Bothwell presiding.

The minutes of the previous regular and special meetings were read by the Clerk and adopted on motion by C. Anderson seconded by R. Fisher.

Reeve Bothwell expressed his personal thanks on behalf of he and Mrs. Bothwell for the arrangement and carrying through of such a successful banquet in his honour, on March 26th.

Mr. M. H. Thompson, road superintendent presented voucher No. 3 in the amount of \$1069.99. The Clerk also presented the following general accounts for observation:

All accounts were passed for payment on motion by Geo. Dean seconded by Herb Syer.

The following correspond-
ence had been received by the Clerk: The Peterborough High School

1958. Ontario Fire Marshall's
office advising of training
course. Regular monthly re-
port of Northumberland and
Durham Health Unit. Depart-
ment of Public Welfare enclos-
ing subsidy cheque in the
amount of \$116.52 for Town-
ship's share of cost of County
Home for the Aged. Depart-
ment of Agriculture requesting
appointment of Weed Inspector
and accordingly Mr. M. H.
Thompson was appointed to
this position. Kerr, McElderry
and Howell re municipal fire
protection. Counties' Clerk
advising Mr. Bert Adams as
an indigent patient in hospital
and also Mrs. Arthur Griffis.
The Clerk was asked to notify

the Counties' Clerk that the
Township will not be respon-
sible for this second person;
on motion of G. Anderson sec-
onded by H. Syer. Hydro
Electric with two contracts by
change of ownership. Other
correspondence was ordered to
be tabled.

Mr. K. O. Birkin school in-
spector and the local school
board were received on motion
of G. Anderson seconded by
Geo. Dean. Mr. Birkin ex-
plained that the local schools
are quite old and some badly
in need of extensive repairs
also the water supply and toilet
facilities inadequate. The
school board had considered the
situation seriously and they all
agreed with the suggestion of
a consolidated school. This
project they said could be at-
tained by adding two rooms to
the Baillieboro school at a cost
estimated at \$20,000. per room,
the school board were in favour
of this arrangement and to
transport the children by buss
to the one school, and in that
way reduce the teaching staff
by two, each teacher having
two grades. All aspects of the
situation were discussed at
some length and at the request
of the school board a motion by
G. Anderson seconded by Geo.
Dean, passed that the school
board be given permission to
make application to depart-
ment for tentative approval for
erection of two rooms. It was
pointed out by Mr. Birkin that
by the reduction of two teach-
ers; and one building to main-
tain and heat instead of five
the cost of local education
should not change.

Mr. Geo. Totten, county
road engineer and Mr. D. A.
Gerrie municipal roads engi-
neer of the Department of High-
ways were present and on mo-
tion of Herb Syer seconded by
R. Fisher the Clerk was asked
to open and read the gravel
tenders and bridge tenders;
they were, for the bridge: J.
A. Peyton Construction Co.
\$3,575.00. Durham Construc-
tion Co. \$1,795.00. John Far-
rell Construction Co. \$1,569.00.
On motion by R. Fisher sec-
onded by Herb Syer the bridge
contract was awarded to John Far-
rell Construction Co.

The tender for crushed
gravel was awarded to Frank
S. Coyle of Lakefield at .86c
per yard delivered on the road
on motion by Geo. Dean sec-
onded by G. Anderson. R. A.
Blyth was the unsuccessful bid-
der on the gravel.

Mr. Harry Larmer the War-
ble Fly Inspector was present
and discussed the cattle spray-
ing at some length. On motion
by Geo. Dean seconded by G.
Anderson, Robt. Fisher was
appointed to interview Mr.
Don LaFonte in regards to hir-
ing his equipment for spraying.

At 6.00 p.m. Councillor H.
Syer moved, seconded by Robt.
Fisher that council adjourn till
8.30 p.m.

Council resumed session at
8.30 p.m. as scheduled all
members present. Careful ex-
amination was given to changes
contemplated in the building
by-law and after a full discus-
sion on the matter R. Fisher
seconded by H. Syer that
Reeve Bothwell and the Clerk
interview Mr. Walter Howch
outlining the changes desired
and request him to draw up a
new by-law accordingly.

On the question of buying
fire protection from Bewdley
the council as a whole decided
not to accept their suggested
contract. The Clerk was asked
to notify them accordingly.

On motion of H. Syer, sec-
onded by Geo. Dean it was de-
cided to interview the local fire
volunteers in regards to fire
protection.

Adjournment was called on
motion of R. Fisher seconded
by G. Anderson to meet again
on May 5th at 8.00 p.m.
