OBITUARY

WILLIAM DAVIS

William Davis, 84, who died in hospital in Peterborough on Sunday, March 25, 1962, after a short illness, was buried in the family plot in Graham's Cemetery after service conducted Wednesday afternoon by the Rev. Reginald Rose in St. Paul's Anglican Church in Bethany.

The pallbearers were Hilliard Davis, Wilfred Saunders, Ross Davidson, Alex McMaster, Clifford Fallis and Leonard Porter.

Mr. Davis was the son of John and Mary Davis, the former Mary Ann Widdis. Her father was a brother of Abe, who was the father of Jim Widdis. William was the eldest of the 5 girls and 6 boys of John and Mary. Three live: Charles of Peterboro, Ormie of St. Catharines, Wilfred of Drumheller, Alberta. Kathrine Davis, one of William's five sisters, was the wife of George Ellsworth of Millbrook.

William lived his life in Bethany. He was a carpenter for the CPR. He carpentered for Sandy Kelly. He did the carpentry of many buildings in and around Bethany.

Mr. Davis attended St. Paul's Church. His grandfather, William Davis, gave the ground on which it stands. The land is part of his grant from the Crown before there was a Bethany, the name chosen by William and other pioneers, who drew the stone and sand to build the present church. Grandfather William was from England. He died at 97. His wife, the mother of John, was from Ireland as a baby. On the Crown grant that became the Davis farm, John, the father of William the grandson, built a house. In this house the 11 children were born. John died at 85. The farm was sold to Johnson Morton, and is now his son Tom's.
