Because of this design, the barrel is inclined slightly upwards, and the eye looks down along the whole sighting plane. Sighting with an ordinary shotgun, the head blocks out the target, but with the barrel inclined upwards as it is in this case, the target is placed on top of the bead, and is in view at all times. Once the stock is complete and fitted, all that remains is sighting-in the gun. Last Saturday morning, Mr. Marsland and Dean Cutmore went out to a near-by gravel pit to do this. It commenced by erecting the target, a sheet of paper about 3' x 3' with a 2 inch circle in the centre. This target is placed 16 yards from the muzzle of the gun and one shot fired at each target. For each inch that the centre of the shot pattern is away from the centre of the target a one sixteenth inch adjustment must be made at the eye. This is done by raising, lowering or canting the stock in the required direction.

With the sighting-in completed to their satisfaction, the two nimrods spent a pleasant half-hour shooting at clay pigeons thrown out by a skeet-thrower, to improve their shooting.
