A Sacreligious Tramp.

Cobourg, April 29.—Isaac Arnold is the name of an unfortunate being who came out of the Kingston Penitentiary last January after serving a four years' term of imprisonment for setting fire to Haig's school house in the front-road. His home is in the neighborhood of Madoc, Hastings County, but as the poor fellow's upper story is very scantily furnished he preferred to tramp through the country, subsisting on the cold charity of the world.
 Being without shelter for the night, shortly after 12 o'clock he broke into the vestry of the Roman Catholic church. Finding the priest's vestments and altar robes in the drawers of the vestry he pulled them out and taking off his tramp's clothes—every stitch he wore—he put on eight or nine vestments and surplices which are used in the sacred functions of the priestly office. A more ludicrous figure it would be hard for one to imagine. Although wearing the alb, he resembled neither a canonized saint nor a holy friar, but was a dirty vagrant and silly fool, and no doubt the Rev. Father Murray will find it necessary to reconsecrate his priestly raiment by putting it through the cleaning process of the wash tub.
 On Tuesday the people who saw Arnold in the vicinity of the maling factory—and Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like this poor tramp—began to wonder what new evangel had come to town.
 Mr. L. Routh reported the strange vision he had seen to Chief Constable Rankin, who went up and found the false prophet lying asleep on the ground at the west side of the old Norval mill. In answer to the Chief's interrogation, he admitted that he had got his "dress" in the Catholic church. He was immediately taken into custody and stripped of the sacred robes. He was brought before Police Magistrate Dumble

and on being arraigned pleaded guilty to a charge of having feloniously stolen certain vestments, the property of the Rev. E. H. Murray. The Police Magistrate sentenced the prisoner to be incarcerated in the Provincial penitentiary for a term of two years.
