Bethany.

It is our sad duty this week to record the death of Mr. James Sisson, who departed this life on Wednesday last after suffering two years of intense agony caused by a cancer in the face. Deceased endured his terrible suffering with christian fortitude, believing that death in this world would bring him peace and happiness in the next, being a true christian and devout worshipper of the Master. He was just in the prime of life being but forty-two years of age and leaves a wife and three small children to mourn their loss. His remains were interred in the English church burying ground, Cavanville, on Friday. Great sympathy is extended to his wife and family.

Business is brisk here this spring in all lines. We notice that Mr. John Lee is erecting a nice residence, and Mr. F. Hamilton is making a general renewal of his many houses, much to the interest and appearance of our village.
 We have just received the sad news of the sudden death of Mr. Henry Hart, an old and respected pioneer of Manvers township. On Saturday Mr. Hart was kicked by a horse, from the effects of which he died on Sunday. Much sympathy is felt and extended to the bereaved family. Deceased was about sixty-five years of age.

Attacked by a Bull.

Mr. John Dames, one of the best known farmers of Manvers, was severely injured Thursday last by a shorthorn Durham bull which he had in his possession for two or three years. It appears that Mr. Dames, wishing to exhibit the animal to some visitors, went into the stall where he was standing untied, and catching hold of one horn reached down to affix the rope to the nose-ring. The bull at once turned and attacked him, knocked him down and made frantic efforts to kneel upon and gore him. Several times Mr. Dames struggled to his feet only to be again butted over, and when finally rescued by his visitors, he was almost unconscious from the rough treatment he had received and the pain of his injuries. Dr. Jeffers of Oakwood was sent for and found that a bone in the right arm was broken; one of his legs was badly bruised and a small bone was fractured; and the shoulder blade dislocated. In addition to these injuries Mr. Dames was painfully bruised a score of places, but considers he was very lucky to have escaped with his life.

Dilly Sanders is Dead.

Peterboro Examiner.
 The body of Mrs. Mina Sanders, who died at the Nicholls hospital on Wednesday of last week, was buried in the Roman Catholic cemetery. Her friends in Millbrook were apprised by the authorities of the Nicholls hospital, of the death, but as nothing was heard from them, the interment took place as noted. All the explanation Mrs. Sanders gave of her presence in the field when she was found, was that she had been in search of a house and had been unsuccessful, and being entirely without money and knowing no person, did not know where to go. She fainted at the spot where she was found and did not recover consciousness till morning. The unfortunate woman made a fatal mistake in not applying at some place for food and shelter. Peterborough's hospitality is too pronounced, not to give shelter and comfort to the distressed when attention is called to the circumstances. It does look like a reproach to the christianity of the town that a stranger should be allowed to lie exposed all night on the wet ground and receive fatal exposure, with hundreds of happy homes about about her. No one, however, is to blame except the unfortunate creature herself; but it appears that she was so weak, despondent and dazed that she was hardly knowing what she was doing or where she was going.
