#### LEFROY-WOOD.

#### A Marriage Ceremony Which Robs Millbrook of one of its Fairest Daughters.

It seemed as if "Old Probs," barometer, thermometer and all persons and things that have even a remote connection with the making of weather had joined hands to make Tuesday of last week a rainy day, and the missing bridges, flooded towns, flooded fields since reported are evidences that their labor in that direction was a success. In spite, however, of the fact that the country for many a league around was being drenched with rain, quite other weather prevailed indoors and in the wishes of the little community of Millbrook; for Tuesday, May 16th, was a day of days for one of the fairest of its daughters—the day on which Miss Nellie Wood was wedded to Mr. A. B. Lefroy of Port Hope.

During the forenoon St. Thomas' church had been made to take on a May-month look, all unminful of the storm of rain outside. The children of the Sunday school, in which Miss Wood has long been a teacher, had gathered a rich supply of wild-flowers which have grown this spring in abundance, and her fellow-teachers took this graceful way of showing their good-will and wishing God-speed, by decorating the chancel of the church. Wreaths of snow-white trilliums and shining golden marigolds, with violets and many smaller wood-flowers upon a back ground of evergreen sprays, decked the altar railing and choir seats, while a profusion of house flowers lent their fragrance and their beauty to make the occasion a joyous one.

Punctually at half-past two o'clock the bride passed up the aisle resting upon the arm of her father, Mr. Archibald Wood, and was received at the chancel step by the groom, who had the friendly assistance of Mr. Woodhouse. The bride was a picture of loveliness in a beautiful gown of white bengaline en traine with veil and orange blossoms, wearing a pearl necklace and diamond bracelet, the gift of the groom, and carrying a bouquet of white roses. The bridesmaids were Miss Bell of Hamilton, Miss Dymment of Barrie, and Miss Maggie Wood, sister of the bride. They wore gowns of light summer silk, trimmed with pale green bengaline and white leghorn hats. The bride's brother, Mr. W. T. Wood, and Dr. Needler acted as ushers. The beautiful church of England marriage service was conducted by the Ven. Archdeacon Allen, assisted by Rev. W. C. Allen. As the bridal procession, after the usual formalities of the vestry, passed down the aisle again, Mendelssohn's ever new, ever joyous "wedding march" pealed forth from the pipe-organ played by Mrs. W. C. Allen. The wedding-party and guests repaired to the home of the bride's parents, where a reception was held, and a choice collation partaken of. A rare and valuable collection of presents was also to be seen.

Amid showers of rice from friendly hands, and not without a parting shot from the good old shoe, the bride passed from under the parental roof on the arm of her husband, and the newly-wedded couple left by train at 4.40 for a wedding tour to New York and other American cities.

The departure to another region, to another sphere of life activity, though it be not a far-distant one, is also tinged with sadness, not only to those by whom the departing one will be most missed but also to the whole community where a life has been spent. And this "sweet sorrow" at bidding God-speed in another sphere to Miss Nellie Wood, will not be absent from many who have lived within our little valley, as she grew from childhood to womanhood, one of the chief graces of it. Wherever it be in the world, apart from the changes eternally being wrought by time, any spot is made sacred to men's minds chiefly by the beauty of the lives lived within it, and it can only be the universal feeling in the hearts of those to whom that little nook of the world called Millbrook is, or has been, a home along with her who was married on Tuesday, 16th inst., that the sweet grace of her life is much of what makes it a malloved spot to them, something, too, that will always cling to it, though she be henceforth Mrs. Lefroy and spend the rest of her days away from it.
